Last month I talked about the hymn 'Brother, Sister let me serve you' and the difficulty we often find ourselves in when needing help or support from others.

I want to personally thank all those people who have offered help, support and prayers for my sister, Susan, and her family.

I'm really pleased to tell you all that after a three hour wait on the 15<sup>th</sup> June Susan, Sonya (her daughter) and I were told by the Consultant that Susan's second liver biopsy showed NO CANCER CELLS!

Susan, Sonya and I were left stunned at the news because we had really built ourselves up for what we thought was the inevitable.

Susan is being transferred to the specialised liver and kidney department at Manchester Royal Infirmary for further investigations as to the cause of her constant nausea and sudden rises of temperature. Her Consultant thinks that they might be caused by infected liver nodules but will know more after detailed investigations. She's still a very poorly lady.

Thank you all for your care and concern over these last six/seven traumatic weeks.

#### HELME LADIES.

By popular request we visited Hampson's Plant World near Wakefield on the 12<sup>th</sup> May. We went last year and, whilst it was an enjoyable day out, we didn't have enough time to see around the extensive facility. It was coffee and cakes upon arrival and then we split up into groups to go our own way. About 90 minutes later we drifted back into the restaurant for lunch. The meals are simple but beautifully prepared and not in the least expensive. Finally another sojourn around Hampson's before we headed for home laden with plants and goodies. On the following day we met at St. Joseph's Church in Aspley to say our final farewell to Jean Sykes. To an almost packed church the proceedings were led by Father Phillip Hall. It was a fitting service for a truly inspiring, friendly and hard working lady who is already being sadly missed, not least by the many organisations in our village where Jean did a sterling job. A few days later our own Reverend Maureen Read held a Thanksgiving Service in St. Bartholomew's Church, Meltham which was another very well attended and moving occasion.

We received a bonus from the Scarecrow Festival. For a number of years we had borrowed a large gazebo under which we placed our stand for selling various items of goods. However we were told that the gazebo was going to be sold on Ebay and that we should make different plans for next year. At the time the joke was 'Has anyone got an umbrella big enough?' However, later in the evening, we received a phone call from the owner who made a super generous free offer of the gazebo to Helme Ladies. Needless to say we accepted with grateful thanks. It now resides in our garden shed and ready for any suitable event in the future.

At our meeting in Helme Church on 26<sup>th</sup> May we held a 'Plant Swop' where members took along a selection of plants and put them into a pool. Each member then took out new plants from the pool in exchange. It was a good and inexpensive way to add to the varieties in peoples gardens.

We began our series of summer evening strolls on the 9<sup>th</sup> June. We met in the car park of the Wills O' Nats and wandered down the road to pick up the path alongside the catchwater drain. It was a beautiful evening and very clear as we wandered along the path towards Blackmoorfoot reservoir. In winter this path can be notoriously wet and muddy but on this occasion it was firm and dry. When we reached the road from Helme, we turned left, over the bridge and immediately left again onto Dunnock Road which is an old, unmade, cart track which is much favoured by equestrians and mountain bikers as well as walkers. The track follows the contour of Meltham Cop and the views from this elevation are simply superb. A panorama which extends from Deer Hill in the west to Emley Moor and beyond in the east. We stopped to admire the scenery and one member was heard to say 'We live in a lovely place, don't we!' - and we all agreed! We ended our walk inside the Wills O' Nats with drinks, a supper of sandwiches and chips and another bout of hearty conversation. We had another splendid evening at the Lawrence Batley Theatre on June 10<sup>th</sup> to see the musical Copacobana. It is the story of an American girl who arrived in New York with ambitions to be a singer immediately after the second world war. The music and the songs were written by Barry Manilow and the singing in the show was very good. #### Monarchial names and places of enjoyment

The very words Royal, Regent, Regal, Princess and Palace normally mean something to do with monarchy, but to adults and youngsters alike, the names could also mean "the pictures." When parents said "We're going to the palace", could it Buckingham to an investiture that we were not aware of ? (Well some people do go there for such an occasion) Not in our case.

Some cinemas or "the pictures" as most people called them bore aristocratic names. Such cinemas were edifices to magnificence, comfort, sumptuousness and allure. On entering you were greeted by the manager in evening dress and you might sit in the elegant foyer, talk in whispers as though in a cathedral before being shown to your seat, paying more for the best seats. Watching the film of your choice you could be gladdened, saddened or maddened but whichever occurred you enjoyed it and the highlights remained with you and were much talked about. Cinemas with these aristocratic names were generally in the "premier league" of comfort and pricing. In the next division were names such as Alhambra, Hippodrome, Palladium, Odeon, names taken from places of entertainment in ancient times. In the lower league of names and with basic comfort and facilities was the Electric Cinema, probably so called because the gas lights had been replaced. A very ordinary title, along with The Cosy Cinema. Smoking as we all recall, was permitted in the audience and nobody it seems thought this a health or fire risk. What with smoke ascending and wet raincoats, in retrospect it could not have been too healthy, but we loved every minute. Attitudes have changed for the better. The highlight of the cinema week for youngsters was the Saturday Junior Club. Community singing with a man playing the organ preceded the films. Every child knew the songs because at school we were taught traditional and popular songs of the era. Once this was over, the curtain was raised which was the signal for stamping of feet and cheering which built up to a crescendo. The first film was a cartoon, then the serial, (a clever move because it meant you all returned next week), and then the big picture. This was usually a western with Tex Ritter, Roy Rogers or Gene Autry, "soft" cowboys by todays standards of "spaghetti" westerns where there are more murders than Midsummer. Gene Autry was the singing cowboy and one story relates to him saying "Those varmits have stolen ma cattle and hogs, burnt ma barn and stampeded the horses. I'm gonna get after those critters pronto if it's the last thing I do, but first of all I'll sing a song! At every cinema after the performance the national anthem was played, most people trying to leave as the music started. How unpatriotic. Ken Dodd said at the end of a picture or live performance, you could always tell the Yorkshire men, as soon as they announced that a charity collection would be taken at the end, Yorkshire folk were the first out! Contrary to popular belief it simply isn't true! Am I a film fan? Yes I am but almost exclusively for films of the 40's, 50's and 60's and the black and white are great. When I am in alone, whoopee, a night to enjoy a film. John Mitchell

## Recipe of the Month Chocolate Date Krispies

4 oz butter or margarine 8 oz dates chopped finely Chocolate to coat

<sup>2</sup>∕₃rds cup sugar 3 cups Rice Krispies

Melt the butter/margarine and sugar in a pan. Add the dates and simmer until the dates are soft. Stir in the Rice Krispies. Press the mixture into a greased swiss roll tin. Melt sufficient chocolate to spread over the top. Put in the 'fridge to set and then and cut into squares.

## The Parable of the Good Samaritan A picture for you to colour



## Luke 12:27

## "Consider how the lilies grow. They do not labour or spin. Yet I tell you, not even Solomon in all his splendour was dressed like one of these"

A friend gave us an amaryllis bulb, complete with plastic pot and a small bag of compost. The bulb looked dry, lifeless, with a tangle of desiccated white roots but we potted it, watered it, and put it on a warm window sill in the light .Transformation. Three or four days later the first shoot appeared. It was very pale green and tentative, as though it was just sticking its head above the parapet to see what was going on, and ready to duck down again if it didn't like what it saw. Each day it grew a little bigger, stronger, a slightly darker green. Then a second leaf appeared.

That's where it is now but I know from past experience that in a few weeks there'll be a straight and robust stem, several dark long green leaves and then the final glory of those huge brilliant scarlet flowers singing silent praise to their creator. That's God, not me. I only watered it.

When we were given the bulb we could have kept it carefully wrapped up in its box but then it would never have grown. There'd have been no life, no flowers no beauty. Life's for living. It can be tempting to stay quietly in our own little corner ignoring the world at large, but we can't, not really. We're part of the world, with all its ups and downs and we have to share in it. So come out of your box today, root yourself in reality and try life. There's a lot of beauty out there if you look for it. And you might even get in touch with the creator of it all.

### 5 Alive – June Report

5 Alive for June 2015 tackled the question – "How to get God on your side?" This might seem an unusual topic but many of us occasionally think "Will God be happy with me doing this?" Or perhaps "If I do this God will be pleased with me!"

After singing "We welcome You," we broke the rules and had a Charades game – we asked "How do kids please parents?". This was great. The children acted out – cleaning teeth, washing up, picking clothes up from the floor and much more!

What was behind this? Our reading was from Genesis 22:3-14. This is the story of Abraham believing that God wants him to sacrifice his most precious son Isaac to make Him happy, and at the last minute he sees a ram and kills that instead.

We read from Brian McLaren's book "We Make the Road by Walking". This gives the background to the normality of sacrificing animals/humans in Abraham's day. In Jesus we believe God said the final 'no' to human sacrifice – or animal sacrifice!

God doesn't need these things to get him on our side! If the children could act – so could their carers! We ask the carers who were there to act – what do kids need to do to get you on their side? What makes them smile? What melts their heart? The answers were very simple!

If simple things please us as carers, what pleases God our Father? We read Micah 6:6-8. He wants us to "do justly love mercy and walk humbly with Him!" It doesn't take much to make God happy!

There were some good DVD clips to illustrate the points we were sharing. It's important to apply what we learn. We had three prayer stations:

Act Justly - prayers about injustice,

Love Mercy -prayers of commitment to acts of kindness, Walk Humbly - prayers about being forgiven and forgiving others

30 of us of all ages enjoyed learning and trying to understand how we live out these great words from Micah – and being reassured again that sacrificing children wasn't on the list!
