Seasonal September

'Orchard Crumble'

Ingredients

- 400g apples, peeled, cored and cut into small pieces
- 400g stoned plums, cut into chunky wedges
- 2 tbsp sugar, any type
- 300g figs, woody stalks trimmed, quartered
- 300g blackberries or brambles, washed well

cream, custard or ice cream, to serve

- For the topping
- 140g plain flour
- 140g wholemeal flour
- 175g butter cut into small pieces
- 100g soft brown sugar

Method

1. First make the topping. Put the flour in a bowl with a pinch of salt, them rub in the butter with your fingertips to form crumbs, Stir in the sugar with a fork and chill until needed.

2. Heat the oven to 180C/160C fan/ Gas mark 4. Tip the apples plums and sugar into a big saucepan with 50ml water and cook, stirring for about 5mins, until the apples are soft and juicy. Stir in the figs and blackberries, and tip into a baking dish. Scatter over the crumble and bake for 45-55mins until the topping is golden and the fruit is bubbling.

HELME LADIES.

A walk in the Colne Valley was chosen for the 21st July. We began in Slaithwaite and strolled up the canal towpath towards West Slaithwaite. The endeavours of the volunteers who began the restoration of this canal more than 30 years ago must be acknowledged for this towpath walk is now a real pleasure and is extensively used. Before restoration it was an eyesore with sections full of mud and weeds, the lock

chambers concreted over and the towpath almost impassable.

It was a pleasant evening as we wandered between the canal on our right and the river Colne on our left with lots of wildlife adding to our enjoyment. At West

Slaithwaite we decided to retrace our steps rather than take the parallel track through the woods.

What concerned us was the amount of Himalayan Balsam alongside the canal and the Japanese Knotweed which in places was clogging up the river. These are environmentally damaging weeds, brought here in Vctorian times to enhance gardens but have escaped to strangle our native plants and change our natural environment for the worse. We were surprised at the amount there was! We have more than our share in Meltham but thankfully the Walkers are Welcome group and the Friends of Meltham Greenway are making attempts to control these weeds in certain places. We ended our stroll in Slaithwaite at the Little Bridge Wine Bar for our usual refreshments and a most jovial chat such that we lost track of the time. As we left we were treated to a performance by the local Morris Dancers who were practising alongside the canal.

It certainly blew the cobwebs away as we met for our evening stroll around Castle Hill on the 4th August. The afternoon had been wet but by the time we met the sun was shining and it was a pleasant evening. We left our cars in the car park on Lumb Lane, walked down the road for a short distance and then took the track to the left

(Clough Hall Lane) which follows the contour of the hill. It is a good track but seems to be used very little these days. Our views over the Woodsome Valley towards Emley Moor and beyond were stunning in the evening light. At a junction of the tracks we turned left again towards the summit of Castle Hill. Our views had changed greatly and as we looked across the metropolis of Huddersfield it almost felt as if we could touch the factories on St. Andrews Road. Kirklees College also looked more like a cruise ship from this elevated position. There was a short climb to the summit where we continued our walk around the peripheral track to Victoria Tower. The scene had changed yet again and our views were across the Holme Valley. We kept stopping to pick out and identify places we were familiar with and

finally our stroll took us down the road back to the car park.

We ended the evening at the Jacob's Well Inn, Honley where we were made most welcome and most suitably fed and watered. The chatting continued unabated until

Evening service at St Marys

Each 4th Sunday we are holding an evening service at 4pm. The services are short, quiet and reflective.

Last month we focused on listening to God. These are some extracts from our service. We listened to Psalm 116 and heard these words taken from 'truth works':

God knows everything and everybody; and everything about everybody. He knows even that which is yet unknown to anybody. There is no thought, idea, invention, place, person, plan, or purpose which He does not know all there is to know about. Imagine, then, the wonder of His genuine attentiveness — "He listened to me." Have you ever tried to say something important or personal to someone who wasn't listening? They held eve contact, only occasionally glancing away at some passing distraction. And they nodded at appropriate moments, and even muttered a muted grunt while you were speaking. But, despite their feigned interest, the moment they get a chance to reply, they either fire back some trite response that has nothing whatsoever to do with what you were saying; or, they quickly excuse themselves with some pressing need that somehow suddenly came to their mind. But God is not like this. He listens. Obviously, it is not for what He may learn — for He already knows. So why does He do it? Because it gives Him pleasure --- the pleasure of seeing, hearing and enjoying our learning process, and the passions that stir our hearts in life. when you pray, therefore, do it with the awareness that He is the God who listens, and is delighted to do so. Your words matter; each one is carefully weighed by the Master of Words; each phrase is turned over and examined with artful care in His great heart. And He appreciates with Fatherly pride everything you think and say. And, having listened to you, He will also speak. But here's the question — do we then listen to Him?

We then heard this poem: Listening To God

Sometimes we talk too much To hear what God would say. Other times we're preoccupied With activities of the day.

Oh, how we need to just be quiet, And listen with our hearts To what the Holy Spirit speaks-The truth that He imparts.

He speaks to us through nature, Where we see His mighty hand. He speaks through our circumstances, And through our fellowman.

Through a still small voice within, We hear what He would say, As we look to Him for guidance, Along our pilgrim way. But, we need to always examine That which we have heard, Making sure it's in accordance With His Holy Written Word-

For God never directs contrary To what is written there. The law He gave so long ago Still applies to all everywhere.

Father, thank You that as we listen, Your Spirit leads us right, Impressing the message on our Hearts That's written in black and white.

We've all heard it "If you don't eat it, you'll have it for breakfast." So you made a token effort, ate what you thought would satisfy your mum followed by the words "but I'm full." The smart response was "In that case you won't want any pudding." Usually there was a compromise between the belligerent child and the determined mum. But we are all affected by the "Don't like it, never tried it syndrome" to varying degrees. Travel abroad and foreign food has made us bolder, but we still hesitate. My daughter when she was a child did not like eating greens and no matter how we tried to get round it, the resistance was like "Rorke's Drift." She would be 5 when we were returning from holiday and called at Wells and looking round cathedrals and castles was compulsory. We wandered round and she held my hand and then stopped at a stone sarcophagus of a medieval bishop who was very thin. She studied this and then looking up to me said "Daddy why was that man so thin?" "Well Caroline, he did not eat his greens." The change in her eating habits was immediate, thanks to a thin bishop and quick thinking.

On another occasion, we had a large family and friends "do" at home which included children, about 30 people in total. The table was heaving with food , loaves and fishes included, meat, pies, pasties, salads and so on, followed by desserts. A boy aged 5 came to the table with his mom who asked him what he wanted. He took his time surveying everything and then with pleading eyes said to his mom and Celia " please, have you got some bread and jam ?" "Yes of course." Talking of strange foods, the name, the look of it, the colour, or the smell can put us off.

In France 5 years ago, 4 of us for a starter to a meal were served with an unknown food which to this day remains the same. It had the consistency of porridge, was sludge coloured and may have had pearl barley or lentils as an ingredient. It looked totally unappetising, so much so that the 2 girls would not even try it. Us 2 fellows, on the basis it might taste better than it looked helped ourselves. It tasted so good we had seconds, but in no way could we persuade the ladies to try it.

The Exodus provided the basis for us to consider the theme of 'Do you hear the cry of the people?'

Moses and the Exodus is dramatic! We had a Reading and each time it looked as if all was going well for the people of Israel the question came up: "Surely now there will be a happy ending for the former slaves, right?" And the answer was – "Not quite!" Even when they got across the Red Sea, things were tough. It's hard for slaves to escape!

We looked at modern slavery. World Vision had a DVD clip showing a Child working in a modern day brick factory. Her life contrasted with the easy life our own children have.

We began an activity based on "End Child Slavery". The children and adults painted in the letters of these words– this was the beginning of the process of making postcards that we will write and send next month to influential people.

A DVD clip – "Do you own stuff made by slaves?" made us all aware of the fact that clothing and items for electronics can be made or mined by modern slaves.

We were reminded that Almighty God is the Saviour, Liberator and Lover of all people, and that time and time again he forgives us and wants to free us. The Reading from Gal 5:1,13-15 was a strong reminder that God calls us individually to freedom as well as seeking the freedom of those oppressed.

And we need reminding of this so we tucked into "Food for Freedom" remembering both the Passover and the Last Supper. There was lamb, bread, bitter herbs, eggs and other food. We invited people to come and take something to eat or drink from the table as an act of commitment to the ongoing struggle to set the oppressed people free.

As Brian McLaren 'reminds us – Moses and Jesus made the same choice: to join God in the ongoing struggle to be free and set others free!
