- It all started when a little boy was drowned, whilst trying to escape to somewhere safe. Who would have thought that such a reaction could have come from emotion for that lowly waif.
- The Carlile opened up to take some goods to send to refugees who'd had to flee and leave their homes and everything behind. Nothing like that has happened to you or me.
- The Crossroads Shop were first with eleven bags, then donated all their takings for that week.. Churches Together were involved as well, with messages and prayers more help to seek.
- Things just kept on flowing through the doors with not a sign of coming to a stop, from tents and blankets, coats and shoes as well, most second hand, like from the Charity Shop.
- A group was set up and the name they picked, Was "Meltham Refugee Crisis Appeal" And emails went around between this group at least one hundred, couldn't say for real.

- And still the bags poured into the old Carlile, filling the Post Office and the upstairs store. The media had now become involved, asking everyone to bring us more.
- Soon the bags would not be strong enough, transfer to boxes was the way to go, with lots of volunteers in days to come, their hard work in this sorting soon did show.
- The operation only took two weeks, about one thousand boxes were now packed. The Post Office down to half its size because that's where the boxes all were stacked.
- But even when they're taken and it's as if they've never been, a place within our hearts knows they were real. So we will all remember who had helped all those in need, The Meltham Refugee Crisis Appeal.

PLOTTERS and RAIDERS

This was the time of year when millions of school boys throughout England, from the October half term onwards, until early November were engaged in sometimes nefarious activities. In "our gangs," groups of up to say 10 boys had gang huts but the nearest we got to criminal activities was to nick apples and other kids' bonfires. We all set about gathering wood from whatever source we could to make bonfires. In our part of the world we were plotting - in this area, and Huddersfield in general, kids called it chumping. It was the Bonfire Plot, because in 1605, that's just what it was. A York man and his cohorts were to be the perpetrators, but as everybody knows from being a child the plot was scuppered. I read somewhere that Guy Fawkes was thought to be the only person who entered Parliament with an honest intention. Discuss please.

The wood that burned the best were the wicker skips from the mills and these were sought after by all gangs. We had to beg these from the store boss. Old hen huts, discarded furniture, limbs and boughs from trees and plenty paper and cardboard plus paraffin formed the plot which was erected on the day in the in the centre of the stone sett vehicular street. Quite amazing. In those days things like this were very informal, - let's call it "The Common Sense Prevails Act" and kids got on with it. You tried to hide the material so it would not be raided by tougher youths from adjoining streets. Some streets close by had 2 bonfires at both ends of the street, and nobody in our town of 15,000 people ever raided theirs. They stored all their wood on top of the outside WC and dustbin blocks, in those days still called by locals, the middens, as they were formerly the block of earth closets. The WC blocks were in very frequent use night and day so their wood remained totally secure from raiding parties and in any case the lads there had fearsome reputations. One gang nearby even stored their wood in abandoned air raid shelters and had the bonfire on the local public recreation ground which was very poorly maintained and looked what it was, a wreck. They didn't get permission from the Council. The leader, the eldest and toughest in any gang always directed operations.

Fireworks seemed to be rationed and the school grape vine disseminated information as to which shop had received their quota and lads were queuing up for them. "Please mister, can't you let me have a few more, 'cos me brother is in bed poorly and can't come for his?" They saw through it every time! The anticipation for a week before was at fever pitch. Alas, it could rain for days on end and reinforcements by way of dads had to be called to apply their skills, paraffin and old oil from factories to ignite the fire. Whoosh, it's alight! Come on, more wood needed. Oh, do be careful, stand back Guy's falling. Towards the end it was time to put the potatoes in the embers. Never mind the layer of charcoal on the skin, eat it and enjoy. All too soon it was over; well actually not quite, because if your fire could be rekindled the following morning that was worth bragging about at school Advance many years to the mid 1960's and we had Health and Safety (I'll call it "H and S Ubiquitous Provisions Act") because it seems almost every human activity is controlled by this, sometimes to farcical degrees. Gone were the street plots, in came smoke and noise control, safety certificates, insurance and all the rest. This introduced the whole community bonfire concept. By all means have some sparklers on your own patio with a few friends and if you dare, a small bonfire but be prepared for complaints. Come on neighbours, it's only once a year!

Some years ago whilst on a coach tour at this time of the year of South Island, New Zealand, an American said to me "Say John in your country, don't you have a big event of some sort on 11 /5?" Eleven five got me thinking, what is he on about ? Then of course it came to me. They put the date the wrong way round in the United States of America (or should it be America States United?) He mentioned this because in Napier and no doubt other places in NZ they make 5 November a big social occasion. There were dozens of private and public bonfires on the beach with barbeques and music. It was the early summer for them and it was a delight for us to share in the celebrations.

Will I be going to a Bonfire Plot this year? The glamour and excitement disappeared years ago, but there again I might be induced, as you might, to go to some form of "over regulated" event, where you can't get near to warm your brains (well school teachers used to say you sat on them) and chuck a spud in the fire. The Jesse Tree

What is a Jesse Tree?

A Jesse tree is linked to the prophecy in Isaiah about the branch growing out of the stump of Jesse. It shows Jesus' family tree.

Jesse is shown at the bottom of the tree with his son King David above him. Above David is his son Solomon and at the top are Mary and the Christ Child. The rest of the tree might include the prophets, Old Testament figures or stories that point to the coming of the Messiah.

What's Involved?

The Jesse tree is used in churches today during Advent, each day wooden symbols are added to the tree, which tell the Old Testament story leading up to Christmas. These are accompanied by short bible readings and prayers that point the way to Jesus the Messiah.

Any one can take part: our Jesse tree will be located in **St Bartholomew's church**. Each day please add the relevant decoration to the tree, accompanies with a short bible reading and prayer (the book is kept with the decorations).

Starts 30th November 2015

Men's Night

Sometimes, just sometimes God seems very close. And sometimes, just sometimes we are given the opportunity to hear his voice, however distantly.

The Men's Night held at Clinton and Jean's was one of those occasions. 25 men from different backgrounds listened to Terry Wilcox, Project Director with In2Out a Leeds based charity working with young people with convictions. It's the only such organisation in the country. It has 4 paid staff and 30+ volunteers, many of whom are mentors. It meets all the standards set by the Government and has worked with 70+ young people.

Terry is a man whose life is shaped by his desire to follow Jesus. He was a successful businessman who found himself in the unusual position firstly of simply talking to prisoners and who was then encouraged to start working with them when they were out. In2Out was set up. For details have a look at their website <u>http://www.in2out.org.uk</u>

If we had stayed till 2am there would still have been someone wanting to ask Terry another question. He did not claim to be a plaster saint. He was well aware of his own fragilities and fallibilities. But in his telling his story and the story of those with whom he, his wife and his team worked, there was to me a sense that here was a man who was Jesus to them - on the basis "that Christ has no hands but our hands." He reminded us that the runaway slave Onesimus referred to in Paul's letter to Philemon was described as - once he was useless, now he is useful. Many of us may feel useless. God seeks to make all of us useful.

Thanks again to Jean for the wonderful gift of hospitality - her apple pie was Great British Bake Off standard and the Shepherds Pie would have called many from the Harden Moss Sheepdogs Trials! And £180 was given to In2Out!

HELME LADIES

Now that the summer is giving way to autumn our evening strolls are at an end for another year. But they have been enjoyable and apart from just one occasion the weather has been very kind. Even when it did rain we still carried out our walk around Nettleton Hill.

On our first occasion back in church we held a poetry evening. This is an event very much revered with the ladies taking immense satisfaction from the variety of poems. In the space of just over one hour we can be laughing, tearful, nostalgic and comforted by the variety of poems which are read. It is also an opportunity for the ladies, who are able, to create their own poems and these can be something special. We had a number of poems by various authors including Pam Ayres and a monologue by Stanley Holloway. Margaret Fenton read a couple of poems, one of which was, from a church magazine called 'Grace'. The poem called The Nativity is aimed at children and puts a different slant onto the normal nativity story. As usual it was a very enjoyable evening. On our next meeting in church September 29th we were delighted to welcome John Mitchell who is the Secretary for St. Bartholomew's Church and who gave us an interesting talk entitled Phrase and Fable. He described the English language as a mixture of Latin, French, German, Norse, Chinese, Anglo-Saxon and many more. Over the course of the evening John gave us a number of well known phrases and expanded on these in order to explain their origin. For example 'A Nine Day Wonder' originated in Tudor times. The daughter of Henry VIII, Mary Tudor, was next in line for the English Throne after the death of her brother Edward VI. However she was a Catholic and certain factions did not approve of a Catholic Queen on the throne of England. The factions wanted a Protestant heir and this was in the shape of Lady Jane Grey who was declared queen but never crowned. However Mary Tudor prevailed and after Nine Days, Lady Jane Grey was beheaded. Another example is 'Rule of Thumb' which originated in times when husbands were allowed to beat their wives. The rule of thumb was introduced to limit the diameter of stick which could be used which hadn't to be greater than the diameter of a thumb. 'Sleep Tight' originated in common lodging houses which had beds without mattresses but instead had ropes. If the ropes were tight the chances were of a better night's sleep. 'POM' which is the description given to us Brits by the Australians refer to the days when our prisoners were transported there after committing various crimes. POM stands for 'Prisoner Of (his or her) Majesty. It was such a fascinating evening, just completely different and one which we thoroughly enjoyed

Are We Ready? The Parish Posada

Making Room for Jesus this Christmas



What is Posada?

Posada is a Spanish word that means 'Inn', and is also the title for a Mexican Advent celebration. In the UK a more recent tradition is to send out the figures of Mary and Joseph on an Advent journey around a parish leading up to Christmas. The figures travel from home to home staying overnight before moving onwards in their journey.

Whilst the figures are in your home, it is an opportunity to pray, and quietly reflect on the wonder of that first Christmas, and to share God's message and promise of love given us in the Christ-child.

The Posada is based on the text from chapter 2 of Luke's Gospel: "She wrapped him in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn". It symbolises the hardship of Mary and Joseph's journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem and their difficulty in finding a place to stay where Mary could have her baby.

What's Involved?

Mary and Joseph travel with instructions, suggested prayers, a book telling the Christmas Story and also a diary for you to put your own entries, photos and pictures. It's a great Advent activity for all ages, and can be enjoyed by everyone.

All you need to do is add your name to the journey rota (in Church) for a night that will suit you to host Mary and Joseph. Another person from the parish will make arrangements to bring the figures to you at a time to suit you both. The next day you need to take Mary and Joseph to the next host on the journey rota. It's as simple as that! Please ensure you have added your details on the journey Rota by **November 26th**.

Mary and Joseph receive a blessing and set off on their Advent journey at our "Worship 4 All" service at St Bartholomew's Church on 29th November 9.30am, visiting each home in turn, returning in time for the "Crib Service" at St James' at 24th December 4.00pm. Where the whole parish will gather together in Church to listen to the Christmas story. Everyone who has hosted Mary and Joseph during December is invited to the service.
