A Letter from your Vicar

February is, or at least should be, a wonderful month. Christmas is now behind us and Easter is still a little way off. So, what's happening in February that makes it such a wonderful month? The answer is not too much. That's what should make it a wonderful month.

Hopefully you will all agree that Christmas 2018 was good, and I would like to thank everybody who was involved in making it all happen. Of course, as the vicar I am very grateful to everyone in all the Churches that contributed towards our services and activities. So much simply wouldn't have happened without your help and support, and a great many people helped to make things special through contributions large and small. However, I would also like to thank the many people across Meltham who helped to make Christmas a real community season. From those who were involved in providing the lights in the village centre, to all the teachers and children in our schools, I'm sure you will all agree that Meltham did Christmas wonderfully.

However, what is February for? The Church has of course got various things still going on including the Journeys course that has just started, there will be some planning for Easter and Valentine's day will come along in its usual place. But what I think is really wonderful about February is that not too much will (normally) happen.

My farming background has taught me to appreciate seasons and seasonality. Unfortunately, the benefits of this are too often lost in our modern world culture. We are busy, we are always busy, and we often struggle to know what to do when things slow down a little. In the cycle of farming and in nature there are times when life takes a natural rest. Life doesn't stop, but the pace of it seems to slow a little for a while. February is, or at least should be, such a time and I believe that we should try to recognise it as a gift from God.

The Bible tells us that from the beginning our God gave us a sabbath rest. We usually think of this as one day per week (traditionally Sunday) when we shouldn't work and certainly it is good to take that kind of regular rest. But, my years in farming have caused me to think in a seasonal way too. It's not good for us to become trapped on a treadmill of life where the pace of things is always stretched. Christmas is wonderful, but we need February to help us return to a more sustainable pace, we need a bit of seasonality to establish a richer and more sustainable rhythm of life.

I hope you can all enjoy February,

And, I promise, I'll try and listen to my own advice.

Remind yourself that God is faithful

'It is right to refresh your memory'

2 Peter 1:13 NIV

A pole-vaulter only discovers how high he can jump when he clears the bar. Then he sets it higher. God does that too. He stretches your faith to what seems like your breaking point. Pastor and author Jon Walker says: 'At one point I sensed God stretching my faith. Specifically, He told me to stop receiving a regular payslip and start living by faith...So with radiant certainty that God would provide because He told me He would, I did what He said and started looking for His provision. I kept a log of every way God took care of me, and the list grew joyfully impressive. God was moving me from a tentative "I hope it will happen," to a certain "I know this will happen." Yet within months I was literally staggered with doubt. I'd lost my focus...and started scrambling for ways to generate income... believing it was my responsibility to make things happen because God may or may not come through...You may be further along than I am in learning to trust God; then again, you may have experienced exactly what I'm describing.' Understand this: a faith that cannot be shaken comes only from a faith that has been so severely shaken that it is now sure, certain, and steadfast. Our greatest concern is getting our needs met, but God's greatest concern is developing our faith. 'Without faith it is impossible to please God' (Hebrews 11:6 NIV 2011 Edition). That's why Peter wrote, 'I will always remind you of these things, even though you know them and are firmly established in the truth...It is right to refresh your memory' (2 Peter 1:12-13 NIV 2011 Edition). So, keep reminding yourself that God is faithful.



Testimony Time...

"Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" (Mark 10.47b)

When I was leaving Leeds In September, after having seen my Spiritual Director, there was a young man walking up the road towards me, shouting and swearing, with a plastic bottle of drink in his hand – which he threw violently to the ground. He was very, very angry and calling out things that I couldn't make out. I am ashamed to say that I was glad he was going in the other direction to me.

I walked on and came to some traffic lights. Whilst I waited with the crowd, the same young man came walking in the same direction as us but a little further over, down the road.

Again, to my shame, I was pleased that he was that distance away from me. He was still shouting angrily and swearing loudly; and then he stepped straight out into the street without looking, forcing the traffic to stop suddenly to avoid him, before he weaved his way across the road and was gone.

As I crossed at the traffic lights, running to get back to my car before my parking ticket expired, I turned left into a narrow pathway which was the only route I knew back to my car due to building works blocking off my usual route.

There was the same man in front of me but rushing away. Then he dropped some coins and stopped, turned around and was scrambling about on his hands and knees trying to find his money – still shouting and swearing and very upset!

I thought about stopping, or turning back but I knew no other way to the car. So I said a prayer to Jesus and kept walking.

As I got closer, I realised that the man was in great distress and crying in anguish for the voices in his head to stop.

I instinctively glanced around to see if I could help him find any of his money, but to my surprise, there on his hands and knees, he cried out to me: "Help me Father, please help me. The voices Father, the voices won't stop!"

I knew there was nothing I could do but I asked Jesus to help, to be there with us and help. And I believe that He was, and He did.

I thought of Jesus and what He would have done had He been there. How He would have looked at this man with great compassion and ordered the voices to leave him alone.

I helped the man up and asked him if he would like me to pray for and with him. He said, "Yes, please Father," and I held him by his hands as we prayed. He seemed to have calmed down before I'd even prayed a word.

After the prayers, he told me he was on his way to commit suicide before I met him.

There was no more shouting wearing throughout this whole time. He asked me what church I was from and if I knew of a church he could go to in Leeds.

He thanked me, turned away and started back towards the city centre. I stopped him and asked him if he needed any money.

He said he needed £3.00 to stay in the city shelter that night – which I gladly gave him – and I received further thanks before he calmly went on his way.

No ... I am certain that it was not all an elaborate act on the man's part. Neither is this testimony all about me but about the power and love of Jesus to help in a crisis.

Postscript: Three weeks later I was called upon to preach on Bartimaeus, commonly regarded as a street person of his day, who called out to Jesus for help in Jericho! Isn't it sad, that even today, when we go to Leeds or Huddersfield, or any large town or city, we see the contrasting worlds of the haves and have-nots? We see beautiful buildings, up-to-date transport, good food restaurants and enticing shops; yet amid all this wealth, poverty abounds in the form of the street dwellers and beggars, sitting in their sleeping bags with polystyrene cups in hand, asking for help in the form of 'spare change'.

So let us pause for a moment now to pray for them – and for the work of all who are committed to helping those in any kind of need.





"ABOUT A BOX"

On reading the January issue of the Parish Church Magazine, page 33, "The Toys we Never Had" by John Mitchell, it brought back many memories from my childhood.

I was talking to John and his wife, Celia, and they encouraged me to write something, but where to begin, I could write a book, but will try to stick to what John wrote about.

Being the second of six children I had to grow up quite quickly (all born within six and a half years, I might add). Dad gave us each half pence twice a week (no such coin today). I always bought Aniseed Balls. You could get five for ½ pence. They were very hard and you could only suck them so they left the flavour in your mouth for a long time.

We always had Christmas and Birthday presents, but other than that there was nothing in between. This was more or less the same for everyone in those days. We didn't expect a lot, but Christmas was a time of great excitement. There were three Newsagents in Meltham and in the weeks leading up to Christmas they filled their windows with toys. Every day after school we would dash round the shops to see if there was anything new. We had a word which meant "bags" and if you saw something you liked best we would say "bags" that and if someone else bagged the same thing we had to choose something else.

One thing that stands out most in my memory was a bride doll which my older sister really wanted and we all joined with her wanting it. Every day we went to see if it was still there. It was taking pride of place in the window. This went on for a few weeks until one day it was gone. I can still feel that dreadful feeling, the bitter disappointment, so she had to think of something else.

But Father Christmas must have heard, for joy of joys on Christmas morning it was in her pillow case. It was beautiful in a lovely blue and white box edged round the top with paper lace. We were very happy for her. But do you know I cannot remember what happened to that treasured doll. We had the box for many years. Every year the Christmas Baubles were carefully wrapped and carefully stored away and long after I was married and mum and dad had died, I somehow was put in charge of the trimmings and it was only four years ago, when Derek and I moved to Mile End, that the box was recycled. It had been stuck together to many times it no longer resembled a bride dolly box, it was impossible to do anything with it, so it was with a little sadness with all its memories, that I finally parted with it.

It wasn't one of the things we "never had" and there must be a moral somewhere in this tale, but it was something some of us had all our lives. We were a close family, only four of us left now and the partings have been very hard, but there we are, one day we shall meet again I am sure, then we shall have far more than "we didn't get" in this life.






