A Letter from your Vicar

Alleluia, Christ is risen;

He is risen indeed, Alleluia!

These are words of great joy.

They have been used to express joy by not just millions, but billions of Christians all over the world for nearly two thousand years. In fact, they may be the greatest words of joy the world has ever known.

These words, or ones of a similar nature, have been used ever since the first Easter and you could almost imagine Mary Magdalene shouting at the disciples on the first Easter Sunday "Alleluia! Jesus is risen!" Of course, their first response wasn't "He is risen indeed" but "What on earth are you jabbering about?" But, when Peter returned from checking the tomb for himself, I would like to imagine that perhaps he and Mary started the tradition of shouting these words at each other, no doubt with many others wondering what they were jabbering about and with neither of them caring what anyone else was thinking.

On the first Easter Sunday the disciples did not start the day full of joy, they were full of sadness and despair. Today many people have good reason to feel sad and at times we can understand why they may feel like despairing. In addition to our personal problems the world often seems full of darkness. Wars, terrorism, poverty and endless political disagreements fill our daily news schedule. Rarely do they find room for any kind of good news. But that doesn't mean that there isn't any good news out there in our world, in fact our world is full of good things and sometimes we just need to remember to enjoy them.

Joy is one of the fruits of the Spirit found in Galatians 5:22-23. For Christians Joy is not something that is only expressed on special occasions and in response to remarkable things. Joy should be a natural part of our lives, our default position.

When the disciples first heard that Jesus was alive, it wasn't easy for them to believe or understand. It took a little while for them to take it in, but when they did their Joy began to over flow. However, it wasn't until the day of Pentecost that this habit of joyfulness began to take a hold. Until then they still had a habit of hiding in fear.

Joy is a gift from God, it is the ability not to miss the good things in life. Joy is a gift given by God to Christians and should be a gift that we pass on to others.

Our Churches should be full of joy and known as joyful places.

This Easter let's not keep our joy to just the one day, just the special occasion. Let's make joy the default position for all our Churches across our Parish.

Alleluía, Chríst ís rísen; He ís rísen índeed, Alleluía!



Dear All,

When Amelia told me that she hadn't received a testimony for this month, I thought I might use this opportunity to thank her for her own faith in active service and testimony to Christ's fellowship and love.

Usually, when we think of people who have helped or influenced us in our journey of faith, we automatically think of those older than ourselves. <u>Un</u>usually, in this case, Amelia as a younger person to many of us, has been of great encouragement and support. I believe that she was the one who first started this '*Testimony Page*' for the magazine, not just to fill up another space but as a witness and encouragement to one another in the love of Christ.

I have (and I'm sure that many of you that have met her too) been refreshed and encouraged by her enthusiastic faith and willingness to help. This has been a continuous offer and much valued, especially throughout the recent year of interregnum.

When Amelia announced her resignation a few weeks ago, she unwittingly gave us a testimony of her own for this last magazine with us, as follows:

". . . Although I wasn't actively looking for a new job, but seeking and praying for God's will for my life, I was recently presented with a new opportunity, not just a job but a career in ministry. I am pleased to say that I have gladly accepted the post which is as a full time Executive PA at a place called Mercy UK - a Christian charity that helps vulnerable young women overcome various issues through their faith in Jesus Christ.

I am a little overwhelmed at the enormity of it but very excited at the same time. So although I will be sad to say goodbye to you all and this chapter, I'm grateful to have worked with you all and wish and pray the very best for all of you here in Meltham. . . "

As Amelia says, she 'wasn't actively looking for a new job, but seeking and praying for God's will' in her life and then she was presented with a 'new, overwhelming and exciting opportunity'.

God sometimes seems to work like that, He answers prayers and thoughts, but not always in the way that we expect. For example, Revd Maureen thought she'd finish her career in full time ministry here in Meltham – but then received a phone call of invitation from the Bishop of the diocese in which she was born, and the move home was to follow.

Revd John told us that when he first saw the vacancy here involving four churches, he put it to one side – but it wouldn't go away! He ended up with the potential of four churches exciting him and (in his own words): '

". . . very much looking forward to working with people from all four of these Churches and across the wider community as we try to understand and follow God's plan together."

When I was offered the post of head teacher at Royd Edge School, here in Meltham, I regret to say that I initially spent time trying to avoid it! I am now pleased to say that it wasn't to be. I thankfully believe it was God's will for my family and I to move here.

Testimony like fellowship, includes sharing together and witnessing in the common bond of Christ our Lord. So I thank Amelia for setting up this magazine page and sharing her testimony with us, along with all the other contributors who have taken part – and I look forward to those yet to come.

MELTHAM MUSTARD SEED is the charity set up by Meltham Churches Together to help raise and educate orphans in Kyema (Uganda). Children are placed with foster parents, cared for in a monitored, stable, foster care environment and receive a good education.

Since 1996, 39 young adults have progressed through Mustard Seed. 14 have a degree. 17 have diplomas and 8 have higher education certificates. There are accountants, teachers, social workers, educational assistants, environment officers, a nurse, tailors, tax officers, plumbers, electricians, hotel and catering managers, and some working in environment and forestry management and the sugar industry. Sadly, unemployment is extremely high in Uganda, 77% of the population are under the age of 30 and the majority of those are under 16. Quite a number of MMS children are currently unemployed but actively seeking work.

Currently there are 34 children in the project at various levels of support and education.

Since 1997 MMS has sent £136,495.10 directly to the Masindi bank account.

Now 10 ex KMS orphans have formed a Young Adult committee. The YA's are initially spearheading 2 projects to make Mustard Seed become SELF SUSTAINING!!!

YA's have raised 5,000,000UgSh, enough to rent land, plant with sugar and they will use the income for KMS school fees.

Please make the walk a family outing or sponsor a walker to raise much-needed funds to help these YOUNG ADULTS build their **OWN FUTURE.**





Local Incident from World War 2

I invited her to submit her memories of this major incident that occurred in Meltham so that it could be published in the Parish Magazine. You will see that she obliged, so please enjoy her account.

My War Memories by Monica Fawcett

Perhaps "my war memories" is the wrong title for me, as although I was in the middle of the action, I was only a baby so my memory was as related to me in later life.



My dad was on fire duties and we lived in Wilshaw. I think he was frustrated at not being off with the other lads who were fighting the war. He had been down in Meltham moaning that "nothing ever happens here."

He was returning home walking down Gyll Birks when the bomb dropped. My mum was inside the house with myself on one knee and my elder brother, Terry, on the other, doing her best to protect us.

My dad knew very well that we were all inside the house so you can imagine his thoughts when he saw the bomb falling. It landed in our garden bringing much of the house down around us all.

Our lives were certainly in God's hands that night and it's a miracle we all lived to tell the tale.

It seems the German bombers were trying to find the David Brown factory; a much needed asset to our war effort; as Lord Haw came on the radio with his usual propaganda programme saying "we know where your David Brown factory is." We were offered a council house in Broadlands and with little of our furniture surviving; we made do with sleeping on a mattresses on the bedroom floors. One piece which did survive and lasted for many years after, was my mum's dressing table. It was the three mirror kind with two drawers either side and a dip between them in the middle. I remember my mum had a crocheted runner all across to hide the scorch marks made where a burning rafter had fallen. My personal memories are more of after the war and include going down to the Coop, or the branch shop on Helme Lane to get the rations and playing house in the

air raid shelters.

Bell Ringing at St. Bartholomew's Meltham

The ringers at the Meltham tower have always practised on Thursday evenings between 7pm and 8pm, and over the years, the quality of ringing on Sunday mornings was steadily improving, dependent on who was available to ring.

We are constantly searching for new ringers to augment our band.

Change ringing is a challenging procedure and constant practice is important. In order to improve their skills, the ringers arranged for other colleagues belonging to the Halifax Archdeaconry Guild of Changeringers to visit on the second Monday of each month in the summer, providing more opportunity for all the ringers to improve with the availability of a larger pool of skilled ringers.

When the clock stopped and we had to close the tower for repairs, these monthly practices moved elsewhere and have never resumed in Meltham and the improvement of ringing has suffered as a consequence.

I have now been able to resurrect this extra practice and am pleased to say that, with the approval of the PCC, the Archdeaconry Ringers are to return to Meltham to re commence, starting on the second Monday of May, June, July and August. This will replace the Thursday practice on those weeks.

I am sure that this will result in a noticeable improvement to our Sunday morning efforts.



HELME LADIES

We are now back to our evening meetings and on the 12th March we had a talk about the Yorkshire Air Ambulance. The ladies who visited are volunteer fundraisers who attend events around our area to raise awareness of the work carried out by the people who run the Yorkshire Air Ambulance. There are two helicopters which are based at Nostell, near Wakefield. When they are called out there is a Paramedic and Doctor on board so treatment can begin as soon as possible. The fundraisers are very important, they keep the helicopters in the air as the service does not receive any money from the Government. We were also made aware of the pro's and con's of collecting, they cannot shake the container at anyone and cannot go from door to door. The ladies, Ann and Margaret, had also brought items to sell, keyrings, badges, fridge magnets, pens and much more. 


