Letter from your Vicar.

The Psalms are a wonderful source of solace and a great resource for reflection. Though they were written thousands of years ago, it is often possible to find a Psalm in which the feelings, desires, and frustrations of the writer resonate with our own lives today.

My heart is breaking as I remember how it used to be:

I walked among the crowds of worshipers,

leading a great procession to the house of God,

singing for joy and giving thanks

amid the sound of a great celebration! Psalm 42:4 (NLT)

Psalm 42 will be familiar to many as it is the basis of the song: *As the deer pants for water*. Perhaps this verse resonates with you now as you think about how long it has been since you were able to worship God in Church alongside your Christian brothers and sisters.

The good news is that we can now begin to reopen our Churches. However, this will not happen with the celebration and fanfare that some may have hoped. The pandemic may be under control, but it is not yet over.

Our reopening will need to be controlled and restrained, carefully thought through, cautious, and above all else safe. The first opening times will be:

July 5th 9:30 St Bartholomew's, 10:30 St James

July 12th 9:30 St Bartholomew's, 10:30 St James

These will be prayer services and will last about 30 minutes and will not include Communion or hymns. We will have to stay within a safe capacity of around 30 people in each service and if this capacity is reached, we will sadly have no choice but to turn people away.

The doors will be opened around 10 minutes before the service, and we need to encourage people not to arrive too early to avoid queuing.

There will not be any refreshments after the service, and we must ask you not to gather for too long outside.

I understand that this is not the way that any of us would like our fellowship and worship to be, but it is a beginning and in time things will improve. We will be looking to open our other Churches later in July if it is possible to do so safely. We will also try to include more in our services as August progresses, but again with safety foremost in our minds. This inevitably means that the service times and places will be subject to change for a little while, please visit our website www.melthamparish.co.uk to keep up to date. I apologise for any confusion that this may cause and will try to return to a regular service pattern as soon as practically possible.

No one should feel under any pressure to come to any of our buildings until they feel ready to do so, and for those who do not yet wish to come or are unable to do so our online services will continue.

To see ourselves as others see us

Lockdown provides more than plenty time for reading. Looking through my collection of quotations and wonderful words uttered by prominent people over the last few centuries, I came across a passage from an SPB Mais book, "This Unknown Island."

The particular passage refers to Haworth but is applicable I think to all this hill country of this part of West Yorkshire.

I may have made Haworth sound inaccessible. It isn't. It is most accessible. It is quite close to Leeds, Bradford and Halifax and Huddersfield on the one side and Colne, Nelson and Burnley on the other. It is a mistake that to suppose that because these towns possess factory chimneys and are interested in manufacture, that they are either ugly or uninteresting. Each one is marked by a very strong individuality. Each has a peculiar beauty of its own. The inhabitants of these places are not colourless townsmen, but sprung from a sturdy stock of hill country yeomen. They are intensely loyal in friendship, vigorous in action, cheerful in adversity, modest in prosperity, artistic, tender hearted and fundamentally humorous. They know and love their moors, but they are not in the least dog in the manger about them.

Yorkshire is by far our largest and easily our most varied county. Its manifold beauties are far too little known and what matters most to me its people are most lovable.

Using the "modern" wonder word; Wow! Unsolicited compliments. Mais was born in Birmingham in 1885 and "This Unknown Island," one of his many books was published in 1932.

Jack Dracup

Jack, our youngest, was born 24th June 2018 and came in quite a hurry, so much in fact John was still in his clergy shirt as he didn't have time to change after coming home from a Baptism! Unfortunately, a couple of days later his blood sugars had dropped dramatically low during the course of the evening and in the very early hours of 27th June, Jack was admitted to hospital with Hypoglycaemia and was attached to many wires and tubes to help keep him stable.

I distinctly remember his first day there, his doctor came to see him to perform some tests, he apologised in advance that he was going to make him cry. But Jack didn't cry, in fact he didn't respond at all. God really did answer prayers over the two weeks we spent there. One by one each wire or tube eventually disappeared and his sugars gradually climbed until he was finally allowed home. However, he came home with the diagnosis of a hypoglycaemic brain injury.

You may remember reading this in a previous edition of the magazine which I wrote not long after we moved here. We left hospital not knowing what Jack's future would hold. Medical professionals tried to make sense of the unknown and told us he may not be able to walk, his vision would be affected, have epilepsy and unlikely to hit many of his milestones.

Two years on, and I can say that we have one amazing God! Jack has surpassed all original expectations. During 'Lockdown' he has learnt to walk, he struggled with grass, but he has overcome that too. He can say a handful of words and, in his own way, make himself known! In March he was discharged from the Epilepsy clinic. He is registered partially sighted as his brain finds it difficult to make sense of what he sees, for example, he struggles with depth perception. However in all of this, he never gives up, he tries hard to learn how to eventually achieve his 'milestones' through repetition and stubbornness. Jack has still a long road ahead of him, but I echo the words I said before... "Regardless of all of this and the difficulties faced, deep down my family and I know, that God is good! He always has been and always will be, a good God."

What did the questioner mean and how do we answer it?

CHURCH IS NOT AN ORGANISATION YOU JOIN; IT IS A FAMILY WHERE YOU BELONG, A HOME WHERE YOU ARE LOVED AND A HOSPITAL WHERE YOU FIND HEALING.

Like many I suspect he was asking the question how do I begin to explore my faith? or connect with people that are Christians? or can I be a part of the church community without going on a Sunday?

What would be your answer? In truth my answer would be the same as many and probably wrong. To encourage the person to come to some meeting somewhere or somehow.

If we are the Church, that is Church, meaning the Christian community, then is the questioner really asking like so many, how can I begin to break in, to this community, how can I begin to feel a part of what you are doing? Can I in some way contribute?

If you are a person asking that question. The answer is of course you can. You are welcome how do you want to be part of us?

Crossroads Centre Update

On Sunday 14th June our online service from St. Bartholomew's was the first Sunday of ordinary time. I've never been quite sure what that means (I'm sure that someone will tell me!) but for the Crossroads Project it certainly hasn't been ordinary.

We have of course been getting ready to open the Crossroads shop. By the time you read this it will hopefully have been open for a couple of weeks. The shop has been cleaned and all items quarantined and put back in the shop. Plans were prepared for social distancing, taping to ensure customers could move around safely and many notices encouraging people to sanitise their hands, to look not touch, and keep together in family groups if they could not shop alone.

My thanks to everyone who made this possible.

The Crossroads Centre slightly changed its image with goods from the shop going into quarantine in one room and then moved into rogers room waiting to be taken back to the shop.

Responding to calls for requests for a food parcel and the restarting of Chris, our debt and benefit advisor, has meant that maybe we are beginning to enter 'ordinary' time.

We are incredibly grateful to everyone who continues to support the Shop and the Centre and to pray for us.

We are encouraged by the words from Isaiah 40 -

'The Lord is the everlasting God

The creator of the ends of the earth

He will not grow tired or weary

And his understanding no one can fathom

He gives strength to the weary

And increases the power of the weak.'

Meltham Foodbank Update

The foodbank continues to be busy and I just can not thank those involved enough for their support over the past few months.

Everyone has worked so hard and been so generous, with both food and financial donations. It has been a real blessing to see the thoughtfulness of people. We have been especially touched by one 9 year old boy who donated money that had been left to him by his granddad. Others have also committed to donating money on a regular basis, or when they are able to afford to. One man went shopping and donated £80 worth of groceries on 2 occasions. Thanks to all of this we have been able to be self-sufficient, and have not needed to ask for any extra funding from the crossroads project.

We are also receiving regular food donations from our two local supermarkets, with the Co-op donating food every evening and Morrisons donating when they are able to. We are very thankful for these generous donations.

We have had many new volunteers starting, helping us in our warehouse, sorting and packing food parcels, and also to deliver them to foodbank clients.

During this uncertain time, we have been fortunate to receive a sustainability grant to enable us to be more equipped if there is a second wave of this coronavirus pandemic. This funding has provided us with a much needed extra fridge and freezer. As part of the Crossroads Project we are hopeful for a further grant which will be used to upgrade our rooms to a higher standard, providing us with a better working environment and storage facilities.

We have also been getting very good feedback from our foodbank clients. It was lovely to hear recently from one of our ex clients who told us that the support she received from the Crossroads Project, through the debt advice service and foodbank, had saved her life.

I certainly believe what Jesus said in Matthew 25:40

'I tell you the truth, when you did it to one of the least of these my brothers and sisters, you were doing it to me'

The Crossroads Shop

COVID 19 and the Crossroads Shop

The sudden realisation that Coronavirus was spreading in the UK followed by the sudden lockdown on March 23rd left us all reeling and although many volunteers wanted to continue working, family pressure and the Prime Minister ensured that the shop closed immediately a few days before 23rd March.

For 3 months we watched and waited. The community of Meltham was mostly very kind to us and observed our requests not to leave black bags of donations outside the shop. Several people kindly moved any bags inside or to the Town Hall and kept on top of sorting the contents so that the shop was not overwhelmed when the time came to re-open.

We heard the news that non-essential businesses could open with mixed feelings. After 3 months at home and realising the potential danger involved in coming back to work at the shop around 50% of our regular volunteers preferred the option of delaying until later in the year.

However around twenty volunteers agreed to open with reduced days – so at present although our opening hours are as normal, we are closed on Monday and Wednesday all day.

We are observing government guidelines regarding social distancing so we allow only three customers at any one time and they patiently wait outside until there is room for them to enter. We ask them to use hand sanitiser gel and the till is protected by a Perspex screen. We have masks, aprons and gloves available for staff to use. The changing room is closed so no one can try on clothing but can instead return garments for exchange or a credit note.

We spent a week giving the shop a thorough clean, removing all the winter stock and replacing with summer dresses, t shirts and children's summer clothes. We held training sessions on different days to reduce the numbers of volunteers in the shop at any one time and went through the safeguarding measures we have put in place. We can now take card payments – another new process to learn.

It's very early days as we only opened on Tuesday June 23rd but we had a very successful first week taking around £1000 and we are coping with huge amounts of generous donations by using a room in the Carlile Centre kindly offered to us by the Town Council.

We're extremely grateful to all our volunteers and also to several people who are helping us by, for example, moving bags of donations to the Centre at the Town Hall to quarantine for 72 hours, then sorting, ironing and hanging garments ready to be returned to the shop for tagging and pricing. At the moment it seems an epic task – I think we all used lockdown time to go through our book and CD and DVD collections, pictures, kitchen cupboards, attics, wardrobes and children's toys and the Crossroads Shop is now the happy beneficiary of such industry! However, we are coping and there is a happy and positive atmosphere in the shop as we welcome longstanding customers who tell us how delighted they are to be able to shop at Crossroads again.

St Mary's Report

As we continue to cope with lock down and our churches being "paused" due to the corona virus we hope you are all keeping well and safe. Let's make sure we try to be kind to one another and keep praying that God will hold each one of us in his loving care. Help us Lord to be patient and to help where we can. Our thanks once more go to Rev John Dracup for the on line services and to Jacqueline France for hosting the Zoom services each Sunday.

On Sunday 17th May Kim Howe led an Evening Service for the parish, on Zoom, at 6pm. 17 computers logged on with more than 20+ people sharing in this act of worship. Kim took for her theme "Friendship" and several bible readings were incorporated in her talk. Jacqueline led the intercessions and Elizabeth Pearson played the keyboard to accompany the hymns which all reinforced Kim's message that Jesus is our BEST friend.

May 24th was the last Sunday of the Easter season and there was a Service of the Word on Zoom. Jacqueline led the service, Rev Dennis Shields read the lesson from Acts 1 and Kim led the prayers. Rev Judy Kenworthy gave the talk and reminded us that God often surprises us and that with the support of the Holy Spirit we can help to spread God's kingdom to the ends of the earth. Elizabeth played the keyboard and assisted by her husband Peter (on the keyboard!) she also played the flute. 21 people shared the service on 16 computers.

Pentecost Sunday found us still in lockdown but not down hearted. Lay Reader Jacqueline led an All Age Worship Service on Zoom and it was wonderful to welcome 16 adults and 8 children from across the parish to this fun service. The service started with a listening activity as we tried to guess which language we were hearing. Jax told a story about how chef Gordon Ramsay turned his life around when injury brought a promising career in football to a sudden end and we played a guessing game - identifying people whose lives were changed by the prompting of the Holy Spirit. Rev Dennis read the lesson which told of the coming of the Holy Spirit and which marked the birth of the Christian Church. We sang an action song and the children enjoyed a finding game. They had to find a candle, something to celebrate with, and something to decorate (most of them found a bun or a cake) and so at the end of the activity they had a birthday cake to eat. We sang "Happy Birthday" to the Church as Pentecost is the considered the birthday of the Christian Church. Jax gave a talk and Rebekah Dracup (one of the children) led the prayers - brilliantly - well done Rebekah. The service came to a close with a hymn and the Grace. Thankyou Jax for a truly happy family time and a chance to be together and to worship together.

On Trinity Sunday 7th June Rev Dennis led a service of Holy Communion at 11:15 on Zoom. Elizabeth and Peter provided the keyboard and flute accompaniment for 3 hymns and Lucy Verille read the lessons. Kim and Jax shared the leading of the prayers and 19 people shared the worship. Rev Dennis took for his theme "The Trinity" and reminded us that Jesus requires us to make disciples in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit and to do so "As we go". These are in a way our "Marching Orders".

Services will continue on Zoom for the time being and as we look forward to the reopening of our churches in the not too distant future let us continue to hold one another in prayer and love. Please pray especially for our children, for the couples who have had to postpone their weddings and families who have lost loved ones during these difficult times. God bless and keep you safe.



An update on our online services – stressful or what!

During the continued Covid-19 situation, we have continued to have a weekly Parish Communion Service online. However, as the lockdown measures were eased, and access to the church buildings was allowed (albeit on a restricted basis) we decided to try and conduct the services in church and do a live broadcast – the aim being to ease the burden on putting the services together which was very time consuming and to also give them a more normal and familiar feel. Cue another steep learning curve!......

There were many questions to answer and challenges to overcome including:

- Finding which software was suitable for doing a live stream.
- Obtaining a suitable mobile SIM with a large amount of data (though we were not sure how much we'd actually need).
- Working out how to do a livestream to our Parish YouTube channel.
- Testing the mobile signal strength at each of our churches and whether it was good enough for a live stream by doing some test broadcasts beforehand.
- Experimenting to get the music and hymns to sound ok (they were very intermittent) initially).
- Finding an easy way to also display the service words for people to follow.
- How to make Rev'd John look good for the camera (this was left to Fiona!)



After much testing and research during the previous week, we came to do our first live service at St Bartholomew's as this seemed to have a good phone signal. On the Sunday morning, we soon found that what worked ok on one day, wasn't bound to work the next! The mobile signal was weaker, and the computer decided it wouldn't connect to the mobile wi-fi hotspot. We ended up having to use an iPad strapped to a tripod with parcel tape (which created a comedy squeak every time the camera was moved to view the screen with the words on) and also use a mobile that was on a different network. We later found that there was a phone mast down in Meltham.

The next week, we tried at St Mary's up at Wilshaw. Again, everything was tested and worked well the day before, but on the Sunday morning, the same thing happened again – the signal was weaker, and then 4 minutes into the live broadcast, we lost the signal altogether. We were eventually able to re-start the service using Rev'd John's phone signal. We really were on a wing and a prayer as we didn't know if he had enough data allowance, or whether he had enough battery. Fortunately it lasted for the duration of the service – (just) though the picture sometimes froze and we had to abandon displaying the service words. After the initial panic that after spending an hour recording the service, it appeared to have been lost – though we were able to retrieve it (phew!). There was much confusion for all those who had tuned in as we had to re-issue the link to view it.

So, onto week 3 and we decided to try up at Helme. However, our trials showed that the phone signal was too weak, and not good enough. The signal at St James' was also found to be worse so it was back to St Bartholomew's. We decided to start the service 30 minutes earlier than the advertised time so that we could deal with any technical issues which might present themselves. Fortunately, it went smoothly, other than again having to use an alternative mobile network as the mast had gone down again!

So, to summarise, doing online church continues to be time consuming, and is quite stressful dealing with all the technical issues thrown at us – especially when we are broadcasting live, but it will get easier – won't it? We could write a book!



We might not be sitting on a beach right <u>now</u> but we can still have an ice cream! This recipe from BBC Good Food is very simple and requires little effort:

- ½ a 397g can sweetened condensed milk
- 600ml pot double cream
- 1 tsp vanilla extract



Put the condensed milk, <u>cream</u> and vanilla into a large bowl. Beat with an electric whisk until thick. Add in any flavouring. Scrape into a freezer container or a large loaf tin, cover with cling film and freeze until solid.

Or make ice lollies with fruit juice, blended fruit or veg, yoghurt, <u>squash</u> or lemonade – whatever works! If you <u>don't</u> have ice lolly moulds you can use anything similar such as empty yoghurt puts with a teaspoon 'stick'. Pour in the mixture and freeze until solid. Enjoy!


