



Letter from your Vicar.



Autumn and harvest, is this a time of year that you look forward to?

Throughout history it has been a time of great celebration. In the 18th and early-19th century these celebrations could often be quite raucous affairs. So, in response to what he thought was excessive

drunkenness and gluttony the Reverend Robert Hawker introduce a more reserved Christian harvest celebration to his parish in Cornwall in the mid-19th century. This, tradition suggests, is the start of the "modern day" Church Harvest Festival.

During in my years as a farmer I experienced a variety of different ways of celebrating the harvest. All such celebrations were centred around thankfulness. Though there were always some crops that you may have wished had been more successful, people would generally be thankful for what success there had been, and we were all thankful that the harvest was finally over and we could have a rest.

These days in Church people are often a little confused by the Harvest Festival as very few are actually involved in the harvest though, all still rely on it. We may try to think a bit wider and try to include everyone involved in the whole of our food supply chain, farmers, scientists, lorry drivers, and supermarket workers. It is right to be grateful to all these people. But, for me the point of the Harvest Festival is that we should all be thankful for every good thing that we have in our lives and to thank God for providing whatever we have, whether we are farmers, vicars, or ice cream van drivers.

Whilst I am thankful to God for many things in my life, what I really like about this time of year is the change. We all enjoy Summer and look forward to Christmas, but Autumn has its own special character as well. Some may not look forward to the dark nights and none of us look forward to paying the heating bills. But the dark nights mean that the grass will not have to be cut for a while, and there is something wonderful about coming into a warm room after being outside in the cold. The birds may stop singing on a morning, but they will now return to the garden feeders.

With every change in life there are good things and things that we will miss (at least for a while). The seasons will change, and there will be times in life that are challenging. It seems to me that the question should not be, do you look forward to Autumn and harvest? In this coming season I think a better question is, will we dwell on the things we don't have, or will we enjoy, be thankful for, and celebrate the good things we do have?

Talking to God

How do you get on talking to God? Lots of people in and out of the church pray. Some might not ever have been in a church but at some special moment they want to thank God or ask him to do something for someone.

I don't find prayer easy, so I have recently been reading and working through "How to pray – a simple guide for normal people" by Pete Greig. And I loved it and learnt so much from it. In the foreword Rev Nicky Gumbel writes "Prayer is the most important activity of our lives. It is the way in which we develop a relationship with our Father in heaven. Prayer brings us peace, refreshes our soul,, satisfies our spiritual hunger and assures us of forgiveness. Prayer not only changes us, it also changes situations. God answers prayer. But *how* should we pray?"

That's a question that many of us would like to find out.

The **"How to pray" Course** based on the book and lead by Pete Greig is an eight week journey through the Lord's Prayer. The sessions include discussions on really practical issues such as:

Why do we pray? How do we worship God? How do we ask God for others – and ourselves? How to hear God? Is there a spiritual battle going on and if so, how do we fight it?

The course is in the form of a series of short videos followed by reactions, a chat and working through one or two questions. In these Covid-19 times, it's likely to be on line on a platform that suits the most people.

So if you found yourself asking any of these questions then this course maybe for you. If you may see yourself as spiritual – but not religious, you will be welcome.

The young ex mustard seed orphans, 10 of who formed KMSYA have now invested all the money promised for the self-sustainability sugar growing project. Fred Nyakana the coordinator who works tirelessly with the sugar, sends regular pictures and updates.



August 16th the Kyema Mustard Seed (original) committee visiting the 12 ha of sugar. Last week weeding started on this sugar. Jessica, (second right) John Bakanoba's sister who came to Meltham for his memorial service. Justus, Mary, Evas, Rev. Alinaitwe (former Chairperson), Rev. Joan, new Chairperson, keep their eye on things.

The other fields planted in April last year are amazing!! These will be harvested next January /February and the income money reinvested into more land hiring and planting the next crop in this same field.

Fred Muhamza, chairperson of KMSYA is getting married to the lovely Marion.



Fred a total orphan has been with MS since early childhood. Since his teens he has fundraised for KMS. He bought his own plastic tables and chairs to hire out for KMS. He took on our idea and encouraged others requesting that FE graduates might contribute some monies towards the sustainability of MS once in employment. Both Fred and Marion are midwives and Fred is also what he describes as a physician's assistant and performs minor operations.



I shared this Covid picture of Fred on Meltham at home What's app group earlier in the year and this was his comment

"This has made me so emotional, it's so humbling u and the entire Meltham Church group appreciating me and my fiancé for the work we do. I love u all so much. Thank mum Jane. God bless u all."

The success of kindred foster care cannot be underestimated. My sister is working with and supporting a young man in Liberia who as a child refugee fled to Sierra Leone where he was brought up in an orphanage. Recently he returned home and through his work was determined to build an orphanage but since hearing about kindred foster care and

the success of MMS he is now totally dedicate to the same. He, Emmanuel, will be contacting Fred Nyakana our Coordinator who is so excited to share and help support our Meltham Mustard Seed Story.

MMS is committed until the end of 2024 to support the education and school requirements of all thechildren currently in its care. Meltham Food Bank What a Year!!

<u>'</u>Lord when did we see you hungry and feed you or thirsty and give you something to drink?.... The King replied,' I tell you the truth whatever you did for the least of these brothers of mine you did for me'. Mathew 25 V37 and V40

My prayer is this verse will remain the guiding ethos of the foodbank as we continue on our journey. As I prepared the annual report for the trustees, it seems right to share some of it with the Meltham community through the magazine. It is the generous support of Meltham that makes the foodbank possible.

When I agreed to take over the day to day running of the foodbank last summer from Rodger. I never in my wildest dreams or nightmares anticipated the journey we would have in the next 12 months. I say Nightmares as well as dreams because there have been plenty of times when the demand has felt overwhelming.

Moving to the new centre in October was the first of many challenges and developments. The increased profile saw an immediate increase in demand. I suspect there were many reasons for this, some seasonal, but mainly more local people were coming to us that had previously been going into the Welcome Centre.

We were overwhelmed to have 33 people respond to our appeal for volunteers. With 28 attending an inaugural meeting in January. From which we formed 'a steering group'. I want to give a very big thank you to Jane Collins who has faithfully stood with me and brought her Administration and organisation skills.

Then of course no sooner than we had felt we were really getting organised. Then COVID!!!! Many of our volunteers had to shield, and others who were furloughed came forward to help.

However those early days were a nightmare, Demand had rocketed and in the early days we were equally affected by the panic buying restrictions. On one day alone I spent over 6 hours queuing!!

It is only now we begin to feel some respite as we hope some of our original volunteers can re-join us, and of course we thank those who have helped temporarily.

With Covid though has come our grant opportunity, we have received a public grant to carry out a refurbishment of the foodbank area, in the Crossroads centre to equip us to be able to meet further anticipated demand.

It feels wrong to talk with pride about the Foodbanks achievements, as surely the need for a foodbank and plans for long term future, in an affluent country, is a shame on our society. The Archbishop of Canterbury has said publicly that his ambition is that we are not needed. However, while the need is there we trust God to equip us to meet it and he has certainly met our needs this year.

As we move forward it would be foolish to lay too many plans, due to the current uncertain national and international situation. But with God's help and blessing we will continue to meet the demand. We will in conjunction with the Crossroads centre see our range of support for the community develop. We will be instrumental in showing the love of God and be part of God's transforming mission to our community.

I am so grateful for the sincere generosity of so many people that support us in lots of different ways.






wearily walked into the bedroom and climbed into bed for a well earned kip.



We learnt about balance, breathing and quite a lot of forms and felt as if we had exercised our minds as well as our bodies when the hour was up. Our thanks go to Jax for organising this and to Cecelia who shared her knowledge with us and gave her time free. On 4th September Kim and Jax organised a quiz and we played one or two games.

During this time of year you see lots of apples on the trees (like the one on the front cover which was our apple tree when we lived in Halifax.) 21st October is Apple Day what could be better than a recipe for Crab Apple Jelly. Although the word 'crab' is used lightly as we later discovered the tree wasn't a crab apple tree at all! Our kids love this and have it with Sunday dinner or even in sandwiches!

'Crab' Apple Jelly

Ingredients

- 4 kg crab apples
- 1 kg caster sugar
- 1 lemon, juiced

Makes 6 x 500ml jars - or use these proportions.

Method

- 1 Wash the apples, removing any bruised fruit. Put in a saucepan, fill with water to just cover the apples.
- **2** Bring to the boil and simmer until the fruit is soft (about 30 minutes).
- **3** Pour the pulp into a jelly bag or layers of muslin and let drip ideally overnight into a pan. Do NOT squeeze the bag or it will make the juice cloudy.
- **4** Measure the juice, and add sugar in the ratio of 10 parts juice to 7 of sugar. Add some lemon juice, then bring to the boil, stirring to dissolve the sugar.
- 5 Keep at a rolling boil for 40 mins, skim off the froth. To test the set, chill a dessert spoon in the fridge.
- 6 When the jelly is set, it will solidify on the back of the spoon. Pour into warm, sterilised jars and tightly seal while still slightly warm. Store in a cool dark place.


