





St Mary's Report

We have had quiet a "saintly" time over the last month up here on the edge of the parish. On Sunday October 11th Rev John spoke about St Bartholomew - one of Jesus' disciples - who was a sincere believer and totally honest - a good example to follow. The next week Rev Judy gave a talk about St Luke a doctor who accompanied St Paul on some of his missionary journeys. As well as writing his own gospel he is also believed to have written the book of Acts and to have written many of St Paul's letters to the early church on St Paul's behalf. He was clever, brave, trustworthy and committed - a good friend and another good example for us to follow in such difficult times.

On Sunday 25th October Rev Judy led a service of Holy Communion and we learnt about St Jude, St Simon and Nehemia an Old Testament prophet. They all answered God's call and spread God's word and if we follow their example, we will help to build up God's kingdom. Following the service there was a short discussion about what work people would like to see done in the future regarding the church building. This discussion included people on zoom as well as those in church. On Sunday 1st November lay reader Jacqueline France led a Service of the Word and her talk was based on the Beattitudes reminding us that those who struggle in this world can be sure they will be blessed in the next so we must never give up hope. The hymns chosen reminded us that it was All Saints Day. At the end of this service an Act of Remembrance took place at the war memorial as we were not sure we would be able to do this the following week - due to the second full coronavirus lockdown. Rev Judy led this and Shirley Langrick read out the names on the Roll of Honour and the memorial before laying the wreath. We then observed two minutes silence. There was no service the following week at St Mary's and services in church have once again been paused. They will however continue on Zoom.

Our thanks go to Lucy, Clive, Val and Peter Harvey, John Andrews and Shirley for reading our lessons, to Lucy, Kim and Jacqueline for leading prayers and to Elizabeth and Peter for preparing the power point presentations and the music week on week. Thankyou also to those who lead the worship and to those wonderful people who turned up twice, despite the poor weather, to tidy the graveyard area at the back of St Mary's church - it looks so much better.

As we continue under lockdown remember that:-Jesus is our rock, our fortress and our might. He is our captain in the well fought fight He in the darkness, is our one true light Alleluia - remember we are not alone with Jesus by our side so let's keep on going with hope in our hearts and a prayer on our lips.

Can we take this opportunity to wish everyone a happy and blessed Christmas.



Inside the Christmas Story: Reflections for Advent.

Authors: Anthony and Melanie Bash

First published: 2012

Publishers: Bloomsbury, London.

One evening around this time last year I got lost down an internet rabbit hole and ended up buying this book. There was a reason for this (I remember the authors from my childhood Christmases, Anthony Bash used to be vicar in the village my parents lived in at

the time) but it wasn't something I was looking for when I went online to look up something entirely different!


I have to say that my usual book preferences are more crime fiction than Christmas reflection but I enjoyed reading it and wanted to share a brief review for anyone else looking for a thoughtful and insightful read over advent.

The book is a series of 26 short (a few pages each – excellent for bedtime perusing) reflections, each based around a different aspect of Christmas. Each reflection starts with a quote and then expertly relates an aspect of the Christmas story with issues affecting us today, and often including examples from the news or personal anecdotes. This makes it very readable and I was left thinking about the implications for a while afterwards.

Themes in the book are varied and not necessarily ones you would think of when thinking of advent and Christmas. Beginnings after endings, science, grief and loss are discussed amongst the more usually thought of (at least for people like me who hadn't actually done a vast amount of thinking about this before) shepherds, Magi, and food.

The tone of the book is deliberately intended to 'disturb and challenge the reader with questions and messages', whilst choosing to 'neither sermonize or moralize'. This worked well for me as I grew up with a Religious Studies 'contemporary moral issues' GCSE syllabus in school which was all about being given a provocative question or statement and being told to go write an essay, making sure to mention several different points of view. I always thought the hardest part of writing those essays was coming up with a agree/disagree answer after having considered various, often contrasting viewpoints! In this book, questions such as 'If Joseph with his young family fled to the United Kingdom today, what sort of reception would they receive?' (p149 in my copy), or 'What did Mary and Joseph do with the gold, frankincense and myrrh that the Magi brought Jesus?' were certainly intriguing and offered a whole host of related thoughts and implications to ponder.

Anyway, I recommend this book to anyone looking for a short introduction to a deeper think. It's relevant, practical, thought-provoking and also quite humorous in places. Plus you can buy a second hand copy for less than a fiver online.


The Tale of a shoebox


