Another busy month despite restrictions and moving into tier 3.

The Crossroads Shop was as busy as ever serving a dual purpose of enabling people to meet together (limited but still possible) and providing high quality items at very reasonable prices. Thanks to everyone who works in the Shop and creates such a positive and welcoming atmosphere.

The Food bank continued to flourish packed into Roger's room in the Centre and dealing with an increasing number of food parcels as the effects of furloughs and insecure employment began to show.

The Centre has remained open throughout and we feel that with the support of the Shop and the Foodbank we have found our role enhanced during these difficult times.

Jesus says we should

- Feed the hungry – There has been a rise in the need for food parcels and several people are being supported with day parcels. There has also been a rise in people dropping off donations and gifts large and small to buy food for those in need. There has also been an increase in those wanting to volunteer. CHRISTMAS provided us with additional opportunities to give many of our families Christmas cheer with Hampers toys and gifts
- Give drinks to those who are thirsty – Despite lockdown there are regular visitors to the Centre for cups of tea and coffee and pop! As people seek refreshments, they also need someone to speak to in their lonely days. A birthday was celebrated with one of our regulars socially distanced of course but with candles on the cake.
- Strangers are invited in – You never know who you are going to meet when you open the door. Many people bereaved are emptying their family homes and needing to drop their items off. This gives them an opportunity to do something positive during this time of sadness and to be met with kindness and understanding.
- Giving clothes to those who need clothing – We have become a supplier of clothes, shoes, socks, and warm coats as the weather becomes much colder
- Ministering to those who are sick – We, like everyone else are not able to visit or see those who are ill, but we see people who are suffering from mental illness. Deprived of face-to-face contact and the reduction of services many people are suffering. Deteriorating physical health and missing contact from close family also may mean they are really struggling. Others have very few resources which we take for granted They may have no Credit for their phone or be lacking electric and gas to cook a hot dinner or even make a cup of tea. We can support them to get them gas and electric vouchers and support from Chris out benefit and debt advisor to help them with their financial difficulties.
- Visiting people in prison – An interesting area which may yet to be developed!

We are looking forward to the New year when the Food Bank refurbishment will be completed, and volunteers will be able to return to the Centre, and the shop can begin to welcome more customers.

We continue to be grateful for all the support the Crossroads project receives and for your prayers and commitment to us over the years. In February we will be celebrating in whatever way we can 25 years since the opening of the shop.

Another activity we have been involved with was the Annual Methodist tree festival. Volunteers from the Shop and Centre created two trees, the first from tinned food and the other from used garments illustrating the possibility of using old clothes to recycle and reuse.

We really enjoyed being part of the festival and were delighted that so many people were able to visit the church and see the trees and not just view them on a screen.

We have moved back into our refurbished base which just has the finishing off to do. December unsurprisingly and sadly is our busiest time of the year. But also my favourite and the a special time when we are able to bring the love of God in a very practical way. Although I will always wish we were not needed, The Foodbank does feel very much like the true Spirit of Christmas.

November was our busiest month so far and as I write this in mid December it looks like December will be busier.

In addition to our normal foodbank service, every one of our single clients received a pre-packaged 3 course Christmas meal, and a shoe box size hamper. Every family received an appropriate size Christmas hamper including all the ingredients for Christmas dinner, presents for children and token presents for adults. All of this is only possible because of the goodwill and support of so many in our Village.

We value all our donations, small and large. To thank anybody will mean I will miss more than I thank, but to name a few.

- A primary age girl who has been doing a reverse advent colander and brought us 3 shopping bags of donations.
- Morrisons who have made us their chosen charity and the many customers who have not only donated food but also presents.

- Alistair Nunn of Rachal's Kitchen who is cooking 30 single meals.

Finally a big thank you to all of our regular team of volunteers who have worked tirelessly in so many, often hidden, ways to meet the demand through this challenging time, and put in extra at Christmas.

St Mary's Report

Services in church had once again been paused so on Sunday 15th November Rev John Dracup led a Service of the Word on Zoom at 11.15am Elizabeth Pearson played the keyboard to accompany three hymns, Jacqueline France read the Gospel and Kim Howe led the prayers. Rev John based his talk on the parable of the talents, reminding us to use the gifts God has given us to grow His kingdom.

The following Sunday was "The Feast of Christ the King" There were no services in our churches due to Covid 19 but Rev Dennis Shields led a service of Holy Communion on Zoom. Lucy Verril read the lessons, Elizabeth played the keyboard and Jacqueline offered prayers. Rev Dennis reminded us to use what God gives us to care for one another and in so doing to serve our Lord.

On Advent Sunday, 29th November, Lay Reader Jacqueline France took a service on Zoom. The first candle on the Advent wreath was lit as we remembered "all God's people" and our thanks go to Elizabeth for making the wreath. Tim read the lessons, Kim led the prayers and Elizabeth accompanied the hymns. Jacqueline spoke about the "Rhythm of Life" and of how we can encourage one another, celebrate and be thankful for good things and be creative. She also reminded us to share and be kind and most importantly TO PRAY. Seventeen computers logged onto the service with 20+ people sharing in the worship - wonderful.

On Sunday 6th December Rev Judy led a "crib service" on Zoom. The second candle on the Advent wreath was lit as we remembered "the prophets" We heard the story of Jesus' birth told in the words of the carols and in Rev Judy's talk. During the service people built up their Christmas Cribbs at home - putting each figure into the scene as they appeared in the story. Jonah and Dillon coloured in their figures beautifully -well done boys. In place of the reading, we watched a video based on Luke 2 verses 1 - 14 and we enjoyed looking at one another's' crib scenes once they were complete.

On Sunday Dec 13th Rev John led a Carol Service on Zoom at 6pm. Lots of people, in costume, took part in a Christmas Drama as the story of The Nativity was told and the children were particularly good. It was good to be able to sing the carols even though we couldn't hear one another.

Our thanks go once more to Jacqueline for running the zoom link, to Elizabeth for the music and for preparing the power point presentation and to all who take part in any way to help us to continue to spend time with God and with one another during these strange times.

Let's pray that this New Year will be a happy, healthy and peaceful one and that sometime soon our freedom will be restored. God bless you and keep you in His care now and throughout 2021.

Carols In the Car Park 2020

December 2019. The night was still. The sky was cloudless. Candles lit for Carols in the Park burnt gently and weren't blown out. It was magical. Over 450 came into Robert Ashton Memorial Park. Carols in the Park, an initiative from the churches in Meltham has become central to the village's Christmas celebrations. Could it be repeated in 2020?

Certainly not in Covid-19 2020! Keen not to lose the momentum built up over the years, the suggestion was made "Why not Carols in the Car Park?" But which Car Park? Morrison's was the most obvious. We made contact with them. Morrison's Community Champion, Rachael Chadwick was enthusiastic. We couldn't do our own mince pies and mulled wine but Morrisons gave suitably quarantined mince pies to those who came.

As a genuine community event, the gifts of Cllr Richard Noon and the team from Meltham Memories were invaluable from start to finish. Kirklees Council rightly wanted properly drafted risk and safety documents. Cllr Noon obliged! I subsequently had an email from Kirklees which said "We wish all event organisers were as organised and capable as your team!"

Once permission was given we had just over 2 weeks to make the event happen. This was the only event of its kind in Huddersfield. We hadn't done anything quite like it before - but the Meltham Memories team had experience of large scale events - Church and Community worked together!

This is an event where we tell the story of Jesus, the Joy of his coming to the village. We had professional artwork for posters and the Carol Sheet. Strict safety measures were required and put in place. All cars had to be booked in using Eventbrite. Within 12 hours of the tickets becoming available, all 100 parking slots had been booked! We could have "sold" more but there were strict parking rules.

A professional sound engineer was booked and on the night many who weren't present could hear the carols all over the village. Simon Ball set up a "live" Link which meant a great deal to those who tuned in - afterwards I had a call from a Melthamer who lives over 150 miles away saying how much she had enjoyed it.

On the night, with a brilliant team of stewards, cars were parked and the occupants came to have a joyful experience. Some brought packed meals, others had decked their cars out with lights or electric candles.

Readers from the schools and the Community found that when they had finished telling their part of the story, horns were pressed. Carols were lead by singers from the church, by Simon Ball and by Meltham and Meltham Mills Band - all socially distanced and as each carol ended the night was filled with the sound of car horns!

Richard Whiteley as compère continued to find the worst/best Christmas Cracker jokes alongside a quiz. Rev John Dracup blessed those who came.

There were donations made by those who booked which, together with money put into buckets as drivers left amounted to almost £500. It was topped up and Morrisons are to match fund so **£1000** is to go Simon on the Streets a charity working in Huddersfield with the homeless

And for those who attended - many of whom then posted on social media sites- the night was magical. The angels told the shepherds that they brought good tidings of great joy. There was great joy at Carols in the Car Park. In the darkness of 2020 a light shone bright, the light of Christ amongst his people.

Another Commonwealth Church; and sad story of the benefactor

Readers of this magazine will be aware that original St. Bartholomew's Church was built in 1651 during the Commonwealth Period of Oliver Cromwell. Holy Trinity Church, Berwick on Tweed, still in its original form is also of that period.

Enter serendipity, and a church built in 1653 by the local benefactor and estate owner Sir Robert Shirley, at the small village of Staunton Harold (population 141) near Ashby-de-la-Zouch, is still entirely intact, but has been in the care of The National Trust for many years. Holy Trinity is the church, built in the Gothic Style with tower, pinnacles and tower. Shirley's magnificent house Staunton Harold Hall is close by.

He was a strong Royalist and defied Cromwell to build his church, not only build it, but in the Gothic style, totally at odds with the simple Puritan convention of the time. Many churches were similarly built including some in this parish, but at later dates. Building the church was as much a statement of his political beliefs, his wealth and his religious persuasion. The church on his large estate, is in an idyllic setting approached over a picturesque bridge with lake woodland and the Leicestershire hills as the back drop.

In the west doorway is told the story of the church "In the yeare 1653 when all things sacred were throughout ye nation either demolished or profaned, Sir Robert Shirley baronet founded this church whose singular praise is to have done the best thing in ye worst times and hoped them in the most calamitous." Shirley believed that the Anglican Church and The Monarchy were inseparable. The building was his way of demonstrating rebellion. For this he paid dearly. Cromwell on hearing about this lavish church demanded that he contribute to the costs of a new ship for the navy. He refused and was imprisoned in the Tower of London where he died aged 27.

Not enough time to chase the cat or find a slipper to chew.


They say it is something called Lockdown, so I don't think it's something I did


