

Letter from your Vicar.

Lent will soon be upon us, and I have been looking at the advice and guidance produced by the Church of England and the government relating to some of our usual activities and celebrations during the coming seasons of Lent and Easter.

Much of this has become "normal" or expected now. Yet, if these things had been suggested a little over a year ago, they would have been considered farcical at best. Of course, I have no wish to disagree with them, and I fully support and understand the need for us to take great care in everything we do but, if this is the new normal then it doesn't feel very normal to me.

Though, perhaps we should pause for a moment and consider. Many of our normal practices as Christians probably don't seem very normal to those outside of the Church. Burning last years palm crosses and mixing them with oil to make the sign of a cross on our heads at an Ash Wednesday communion may seem just as strange as, the now recommended, sprinkling of dry ashes from an appropriate distance. Using bread and wine to represent Jesus's body and blood does require some explanation, and the desire to share a common cup is a particular issue at the moment.

The desire to gather in numbers to pray, sing songs and share acts of worship, and signs of our fellowship are all expressions of our communion in Christ and our oneness as his body. None of these are easy at the moment. And, though some of the new things have help us to think through what is really important, these strange ways often leave me wondering whether to laugh or cry.

That mixture of joy, sorrow, and confusion is in fact just right for lent. Throughout lent Christians consider both the pain and suffering of Jesus on Good Friday, and the sorrow that it is our own sin which made his sacrifice necessary. At the same time, we can't help but acknowledge the joy that we feel in knowing that through this act of his sacrifice we are forgiven and restored into relationship with our God.

Perhaps its only right that we have this mixture of emotions. Perhaps the main thing is that we allow ourselves to feel them. I believe that, in the feeling of both joy and sorrow, in the acceptance of our confusion and frustration, we can find a place where we know that we can't work it all out on our own. If, in that place, we are willing to turn to God then I am certain he will meet us there. I can't promise that in that place we will find all the answers we might like. But, in Jesus, we will find a God that we can trust to have the answers that we need, and the grace and love not to mind that we don't understand them.

We are constantly looking for new ways of reaching out to those in need and are looking forward to supplying prepared meals for those still not able to leave their homes due to Covid 19




As we seek to discover the way froward for the Crossroads project we look forward to seeing where Jesus will lead and how best we can use the resources we have been given.

News from The Food Bank.

And My God Will Provide All Your Needs According To His Glorious Riches In Christ Jesus. Philippians 4:19.

In the December issue of this magazine I reported on the fantastic and generous pulling together of the community in Meltham to meet the needs of those who would have gone hungry and children who would not have had Christmas presents, in our community.

Due to the publication deadlines I wrote this before Christmas, we are thrilled to report that, in addition to our normal foodbank service, and December was another month were demand increased. Families were provided with hampers of food; Children presents and single clients a pre cooked 3 course Christmas Dinner. It is my vision that we are known for our generosity as I believe this reflects the heart of God, and thanks to our fantastic village we are.

Several of our clients expressed that they were overwhelmed, by the generosity. Many commenting on how nice the meal was.

One our clients who has had more than his share of challenges in life. Told us he was able to cook his Christmas dinner in his oven for the first time. The second-hand cooker and washing machine being provided by a government agency, was just delivered. They were connected by one of our suitably experienced volunteers otherwise they would have been useless.

It was with a heavy heart and some degree of fear and dread that I listened to the prime minister telling us on 4th January that we were to be lockdown again. I dreaded being in the situation of the first Lockdown, when like everybody else we queued for hours to get the basics for our clients.

Unfortunately, several of our volunteer team, rightly felt unable to continue as frontline volunteers. From the joy of our provision at Christmas I found myself thinking I can't do this again. My prayer was, "God we need your help, how are we going to manage?"

God has certainly answered, more volunteers have come forward and stepped up, to keep the team up to strength. We continue to have our needs met and have been able to meet the sadly increasing demand.

We thank God for his continued protection. Although we do try to be responsible and safe, working so closely together does present its challenges. Not one member of the team has been, infected with Covid. We have really relied on Gods protection, the effect of having to close the centre on so many would be devastating. We are truly grateful to both God and all our, volunteers, many supporters both individuals and business' we do not take the goodwill of the Meltham Community for granted.

Please continue to stand with us with both your support and prayers for our provision and protection, as we continue to battle the evils of Co Vid poverty and need.

I worked my way slowly through it and found every chapter full of treasure. It works its way through the Lord's Prayer and is both easy to understand and very practical.

I then found that there is a Course based on the book called "The Prayer Course" lead by Pete Greig. The sessions can be watched on YouTube.

The Prayer Course is split into eight sessions:

1 Why Pray? 2 Adoration 3 Petition 4 Intercession 5 Unanswered Prayer 6 Contemplation 7 Listening 8 Spiritual Warfare

I thought about doing the course in the Parish by Zoom and wondered if others might like to join. To my great pleasure 19 people have taken part since we launched the Course in November 2020. We did the first four topics in 2020 and started the next 4 in January 2021. I think we have all learnt from the course and from each other. As one contributor wrote, "I feel comfortable giving my views in the group – and don't feel judged." Another wrote "I shall keep wrestling." Another: "Loving this course and very special to share with you all."

There are participants from across Meltham and beyond. Two colleagues from my work have dipped in.

Prayer not only changes us, it changes situations. God answers prayer. If you think – "That's fine, but how do we pray", I'm more than happy to run another Prayer Course later in 2021 if there is a demand. Please contact me if you are interested.



St Mary's Report

As Elizabeth and Peter were self isolating the Service of the Word held on 20th December took place on zoom only. Rev John Dracup led the worship and gave the talk. The fourth candle on the advent wreath, representing the Virgin Mary, was lit and a prayer offered. Rev John reminded us that when the Angel Gabriel told Mary she was about to be the mother of the Son of God she said yes. Jacqueline France read the lessons and ran zoom, Elizabeth Pearson played the keyboard and prepared the power point presentation and Kim Howe led us in prayer. It was good to welcome a good number of people to the service, especially Cheryl from Australia and best wishes were expressed for a happy and peaceful Christmas despite the strange times we are living in.


On Christmas Day Rev Judy Kenworthy led a service of Holy Communion on zoom. Jacqueline ran the zoom presentation, Elizabeth played keyboard and Kim led our prayers. One of the carols took the form of a video that we could sing along to and the children showed us their favourite present. Rev Judy gave the talk and spoke about how Jesus is God with us and of how He offers us hope and the gift of eternal life. Rev John joined us for the last part of the service and wished us all a happy Christmas.

The following Sunday (27th) there was no service in church but we were able to share in a pre-recorded service on line. On 3rd January 2021 - the first Sunday of the new year Lay leader Jacqueline France led a Service of the Word on zoom. We thought about our new calendars and of how they are used to plan our time. Jacqueline reminded us that God has a plan and that the Three Wise Men who visited Jesus were part of that plan. God only wants good for us and that should give us hope when things go wrong in our lives. Mary Greenwood read the lessons and Peter Harvey led the prayers. Elizabeth and Peter provided the music on keyboard and flute for the three carols we sang.

The following Sunday there was a Holy Communion service on zoom. This was led by Rev Judy Kenworthy who based her talk on "New Beginnings" The reading from Genesis, chapter 1, told us how God made a new beginning as He began His work of creation. The reading from St Mark's Gospel told us about Jesus' Baptism which marked the beginning of Jesus' ministry on earth and we thought about our own baptisms and the New year and of how these special times mark a new start - a new beginning. Rev Judy reminded us that as we face an unknown future we can do so by knowing that we are loved and saved by our wonderful and amazing God. Tim read the lessons, Jacqueline offered prayers and Elizabeth and Peter provided the music. Despite one or two technical hitches, which do happen sometimes don't they, we managed to finish the service and then plans were made for the production of a welcome pack to give to new families moving into the village and for the resumption of "Care and Share" meetings- beginning on Tuesday 12th January at 6.15pm.

POSTAL SLOGANS

Many years ago an elderly relative (knowing I had an interest in stamp collecting) gave me an album of postal slogans he had collected. At that time, beyond a cursory glance I had not looked at the album. However, now with an abundance of time at home I perused them. Postal slogans were first introduced in 1918 and had national coverage on envelopes bearing the words "Buy National War Bonds Now" and "Feed the Guns with War Bonds." Through the century slogans pan UK and especially in this pandemic, appropriate messages continue to adorn envelopes. Others are more localised and arrangements can be made with Royal Mail for this facility.

Here are some from the album, which in particular caught my attention. "British Goods are Best" from 1926 and a similar one from February 1968, "I'm Backing Britain." Amazing, in a way that we, us, the government should have to say this, but when, like others, I look at goods and provisions we buy it is hard to find a UK stamp of origin. In September 1926 there appeared "Say it by Telephone." Saying it by such means nowadays does not need promoting and perhaps what should be encouraged is for folk to pick up a pen and write a letter, but that is old fashioned. Another one from 1968 "Check Your Tyres Before the Law Does." 1946 bore the words "30 Years National Savings, 1916-1946." In the same year a plea to the nation during food rationing , "Don't waste Bread Others Need It." Many of these imploring the nation with contemporary messages are considered necessary.

"Civil Defence is Common Sense," a catchy message from October 1958. CD was scrapped probably 40 years ago. (somebody out there will remember the date and may well have been involved as a member). A national one that appeared in 1972 and is still doing good work "To Preserve a Heritage, Historic Churches Trust." One from USA in March 1962 was rather touching, if these days one word is rather dated. It read "At Easter help Crippled Children, Milwaukee, Wisconsin." On the theme of flight, June 1949 "Fly British Airlines." This was a time when package flights and a multitude of airlines were none existent. The only UK rival I recall was British European Airlines (BEA). A message to celebrate a humanitarian effort was "Berlin Airlift 1948-49, when, led by the USA, a continuous drop of goods occurred to a besieged West Berlin. A notable British flight achievement was

commemorated in 1969 with "Manchester Airport Salutes Alcock and Brown 1919-1969. First Atlantic Flight by two Manchester Men." Our own county gem "Yorkshire Holiday Paradise, Whitby, Scarborough and Filey, 1975."

On the reorganisation of Local Government in 1974, "Sowerby Bridge U D C, 1856 - 1974, Bids You Farewell."

An amusing one in 1974 was "Robin Hood held his Conferences in Nottingham. Why don't you?"

Recently we have seen the national slogan using Captain Sir Tom Moore's words endorsed on Royal Mail.

These are a mere handful of thousands and thousands. I'm sure like me when you receive a letter, (which is rare these days) as well as trying to identify the writing on the envelope you look at the post mark and any slogan. Interested?


