Food Bank News

The summer was much busier that we expected in the Foodbank. June was our busiest month on record with over a Hundred parcels supplied. Clearly this is not something we would expect as for Foodbanks generally winter is our busiest time. Sadly many families and individuals will have to choose between heating and eating. Being employed, no longer means you can meet your basic living costs.

For example

People will be aware of the recent energy price increase that is expected to put about £230 per year on the average families, bill. That's about £5.00 per week. Of course if you are disabled or not working for many reasons you are at home more therefore the increase is even greater.

The Government is still planning to remove the £20 uplift to Universal credit, that was brought in to support people in the pandemic.

Then there is inflation running at 3.5% food inflation is running higher, and the CEO of the COOP said publicly on the 17th of September that he expects it to increase much further.

Much of this will affect everybody, but clearly those on lower incomes will be most affected.

We therefore do expect the winter to be very challenging for us. But I feel confident that whatever the demand we will be able to rise to the challenge. Why?

- 1. I am convinced we have God fighting our battles for us.
- 2. We have a great brilliant team of volunteers.
- 3. We get fantastic support from local business's
- The Local community support both in terms of food donated and financial donations is amazing.
- 5. We are part of the Crossroads project, which gives us great strength and resilience.

We thank God for his provision for us, and also remember the millions of those around the world, who do not have enough to eat.

We thank our local churches and schools who donate their produce to us. I will aim to mention them by name next month.

THE INFLUENCE OF MELTHAM MUSTARD SEED



In last month's Parish magazine, I wrote about the exciting successful first sugar harvest, marking the beginning of the MMS self-sustainability project in Kyema, Uganda.

Becoming self-sustaining will enable KMSYA to continue investing in sugar **and** give enough income to support MS

orphans in the future. The orphan support is two-fold: care within their kindred foster family (currently being promoted throughout the world as the best care for orphaned children) and their education.

While on a church mission in Sierra Leone in 2013, my sister Joanna and her husband Peter, visited an orphanage and met a young man Emmanuel from Liberia. It was the Castleford Tiger's T shirt he was wearing that did it!!! As a child refugee he had fled to Sierra Leone to escape - "I was a war affected child during the past brutal, bloody, violence and senseless political civil war in Liberia that led to tremendous loss of lives in 1999-2002". Having been separated from his parents, (thankfully later reunited with them living in a refugee camp) he was brought up in an orphanage in Freetown the capital of SL, where he was given a home and education.

In 2019, after 11 years as a refugee, Emmanuel returned to Sierra Leone and through his work was determined to help orphaned children, his goal to build an orphanage. However, my sister Joanna told him about MMS kindred foster care. I also spoke with Emmanuel about our kindred foster care support and put him in

contact with Fred Nyakana our Mustard Seed Coordinator in Kyema who shared his MS story and inspired Emmanuel to become totally dedicate to kindred foster care rather than build an orphanage. Joanna and Peter support by fundraising and sponsorship in the UK. Emmanuel was put in contact with Mick Pease of the charity SFAC - Strengthening Families And Children. (SFAC give professional advice through expert social workers, therapists, lawyers and judges to train adults all over the world involved in helping children to thrive.) I remembered Nigel telling me about his own involvement, and about Mick, who had been to



Meltham to speak to the men's group at St James's. With this help, including SFAC's continued involvement, Emmanuel was able to set up and runs the charity 'Gods Kingdom of Hope International', registered in Liberia. This supports and



mentors many school children and is beginning kindred foster care.

Naomi, their first kindred foster child, supported from UK.

"A happy Wednesday morning in January. God is proving his endless love to me and my program all the time, I am happy!!!! Mom and daddy Peter were able to support a kid through my support program. Naomi has never been to school before, now she is in school and she is very happy in class.



Thanks to you all for your lovely concerns towards our underprivileged children in this part of the world. We are growing strongly together", Emmanuel.

In August Naomi graduated from her first school, already ready to progress to elementary school. Right - Naomi and her kindred foster carer.

The success of kindred foster care cannot be underestimated, its ethos is spreading, another Mustard Seed, planted in Liberia.

ST BART'S - SCREEN INSTALLATION - DON'T FORGET YOUR SPECS!

When the church buildings first re-opened, it was advised not to distribute service booklets in order to minimise potential spread of the virus, and so we started using the projector and screen that we had previously used for the Good Friday performances. This served us well, but was located high up on the vicar's vestry roof and its age meant it was not as clear as more modern devices and sometimes difficult to see.

After doing a short trial with a very large TV which was destined for St Mary's, and following positive feedback from both the Wednesday and Sunday Morning congregations, we decided to go ahead and purchase one - the TV being much clearer and easier to read, despite being a little smaller than the projector screen.

We decided a suitable location would be next to the pulpit and at a similar height this being deemed the optimum position. A faculty would be required for a permanent installation, so the challenge was to have a semi-permanent installation which did not involve any invasive work, and could be removed without trace if necessary. It also needed to be sympathetic to the existing surroundings. I came up with an idea on how this might be achieved, but didn't have the ability to implement it, so I called upon my good friend Lee to cast an eye over it - he likes making things! Lee transformed the idea into a design, along with measurements and specification for the wood required. We were struggling to source said wood so I called upon my brother-in-law Paul (a Joiner), to see if he had any off-cuts. The sizes we required were more than just off-cuts but he managed to source what was required. He then got his brother Lee to add a veneer to the required pieces to ensure a nice finish could be achieved.

Once we had the wood, with a little trial and error, we managed to stain it to match the existing wood colour in church (though this is quite varied when you start looking closely). We then assembled the wood and attached the TV bracket, then fixed on the TV.

So, a great team effort from family and friends - not only a job well done but also for zero cost (other than purchasing the TV itself and the bracket, and probably a few beers). A grateful thank you to Roebuck & Holmes Joiners (Paul & Lee Holmes) for providing the wood and veneer free of charge, and to my friend Lee Jagger for the design and installation (though it's a good job I was keeping an eye on him)

We now have a clear display of our service and hymn words and hopefully look forward to putting the screen to good use in new and exciting ways to enhance our services - just don't forget your glasses! You never know, Rev'd John may become virtual, and appear on it whilst preaching one of his wonderful sermons from one of our other churches - he could literally be in two places at once - which is becoming more and more, a requirement for our Vicar!

Whilst writing this article, it came to me how well this story fits in with the popular hymn - 'Father, I place into your hands'.....

v1 - Father, I place into your hands, the things I cannot do (that's me!)
 v2 - Father, I place into your hands, my friends and family (that's Lee, Paul and

Lee)

v3 - Father, we love to sing your praise, and in your name rejoice (that's all of us, following the words on the screen during the services)

Anglican Evangelicals ...a force to be reckoned with!

I've just finished reading the biography of the Rev James Packer. He was a "mover & shaker" within the Church of England and one of the foremost 20th Century evangelical scholars. He played an important part in the revival of the evangelical movement in the Church of England during the 1960's and 1970's before going on to exert an influence internationally.

His faith was deeply influenced by Calvinism and by the general thrust of Reformation theology.

It was during those two decades, that evangelicals stressed: -

The supremacy of Scripture The majesty of Jesus Christ The Lordship of the Holy Spirit The necessity of conversion (either instantaneous or gradual) The priority of evangelism, and The importance of fellowship.

As a young Christian, during my teens and twenties, these six theological points featured so strongly in my life as a young Christian whilst I worshipped at St James Church, Slaithwaite, during the Rev Barry Harper's ministry in the 1960's and 1970's. There would be at least 30 teenagers crammed into the vicarage, every Sunday evening after attending Evening Prayer, who were eager to learn and grow in our faith as Christians.

During this time, I felt the Lord calling me to serve Him as a Church Army Evangelist and applied to Church Army headquarters. After a day of interviews, in London, followed by a weekend Selection Conference I was successful in my application and commenced my 3-year training at the Church Army College in Blackheath, London, in January 1975.

Whilst in my third and final year at the Church Army Wilson Carlile Training College, I was selected to represent the College at the National Evangelical Anglican Congree held at Nottingham University in 1977. It was a wonderful experience for me to personally hear some brilliant talks from the likes of Rev James Packer, Rev John Stott and Rev Michael Green. To be able to sit at the feet of these leading Anglican Evangelicals was a mind-blowing experience for me. This conference was referred to in Packer's biography, when the following Statement from the conference was made which set out an eight-point vision of church families as being: -

"Renewed individuals and a new and revived church,

Alive with the life of Christ,

Subject to the word of Christ,

Filled with the Spirit of Christ,

Fulfilling the mission of Christ, Constrained by the love of Christ, Preaching the good news of Christ, and Thrilled in its worship by the glory of Christ."

This is a powerful vision, from the NEAC 1977 conference, for church fellowships and individual Christians to embrace...to be Christ-centred and base our life, work and witness on the authority and inspiration of the Bible.

When James Packer passed away in July 2020, at the age of 93, Archbishop Justin Welby paid the following tribute to this great yet humble man of faith: -

"Dr James Packer's death ends a wonderful service to God by a disciple of learning, wisdom and holiness. A giant of his time".



In this 21st Century, the Church appears to be in decline in many parts of the UK, but evangelicalism has gone against the flow and has seen a rise in influence and popularity within the Church of England: -

40% of Anglicans attended evangelical churches

- Since the mid-1970's, there have been three Archbishops of Canterbury who were evangelicals
- In 2016, 70% of Ordinands were reported to be evangelicals and 18 out of 42 dioceses had evangelical bishops.

The future of the Church of England is certainly not all doom and gloom.

By taking onboard the eight-point vision that came from the National Evangelical Anglican Congress back in 1977, as individual Christians and collectively as church families, then there is hope for the future as we reach out to our communities and share the message of God's love.

"God's Spirit is in my heart, He has called me and set me apart; This is what I have to do, What I have to do.

He sent me to give the Good News to the poor, Tell prisoners that they are prisoners no more Tell blind people that they can see and set the downtrodden free And go tell everyone the news that the Kingdom of God has come And go tell everyone the news that God's Kingdom has come."

St Mary's Report

We hope you have all had a good summer and perhaps a few days away relaxing and recharging your batteries and enjoying a bit of sunshine.

Rev Judy Kenworthy was celebrant at a service of Holy Communion on Sunday 21st August with some people on zoom and some in church as is our normal pattern. John Andrews read the lessons and Kim Howe offered the prayers and assisted with the chalice. Elizabeth Pearson played the organ and Peter operated the power point. Rev Judy spoke about how the presence of God is found in Jesus and we need to stay close to Him so that out lives can be lived to the full and our spiritual hunger satisfied.

There was no service at St Mary's the following week as there was a United Parish Communion at St Bartholomew's Church. This was the first united service we have been able to hold since the Covid pandemic hit the country 18 months ago. Rev John Dracup led this service and it was so wonderful to be able to share worship and to spend time with God and one another and to sing, praise and pray together. We were reminded by Rev John that God's heart burns with love for us and in response we should love and praise Him from the depths of our being. It was so lovely to be able to share coffee together following the service.

On 5th September Lay Reader Jacqueline France led a family service based on 'Kindness' We watched a video, sang an action song and thought about how we can be kind to the people who are different to us and to our neighbours and our friends. On Friday 17th September the Funeral of Nellie Fielding took place at St Mary's.
