# Letter from your Vicar.

It is often difficult to think of something to say when it comes to writing this monthly letter. This month is different, as there are many things that I feel I should try to cover. However, I feel that there is at least a common theme "legacy".

Many of you may have heard that our four Churches are amongst the beneficiaries of Muriel Stead's will. St Mary's, St James, and Christ Church have each been given a little over £17,000 and St Bartholomew's just over £130,000. This is without question a considerable and generous legacy and we are deeply grateful to Muriel. As with all those who have benefited from Muriel's generosity, there are no restrictions on how this money can be used but please be assured that we will do all we can to use it wisely, good stewardship is a strongly encouraged in the bible. However, it is a fact that the Churches in our parish have struggle for many years to achieve a sufficient annual income to cover their annual costs. Whilst this legacy amounts to a considerable sum of money, we still need to work on our regular income if we are to use this legacy for something more lasting than paying the bills. As such I am truly grateful to all those who's generosity continues to support our ministry within this parish.

This month is when we observe Remembrance Sunday and remember the sacrifice of all those who have suffered and died defending our way of life. It is important to remember that the legacy of these people is not war but, peace and freedom. Our prayer is not just that their legacy will live on but that it might be shared with every people around the world. Remembrance Sunday this year will be on the **14<sup>th</sup> November** and an act of remembrance will be held for the parish at St Bartholomew's. After consulting with other groups within the parish it has been decided that, due to covid, this should be held outside in a similar way to last year. We will be gathering in time to begin at 10:45am.

A memorial service will be held on the **7**<sup>th</sup> **November** at 4:00pm at St Bartholomew's. Over the last couple of years many people have been denied the opportunity to hold the kind of service they would have chosen after the loss of a loved one. Limited numbers, the lack of singing, and the inability to gather together after a funeral are amongst the restrictions that many people have faced. This service cannot undo the pain and loss that people feel, or that this has been made worse by the restrictions we have all experienced. However, it is my hope that it will allow us an opportunity to celebrate the great legacy of treasured memories that we all hold onto. Whether you wish to remember someone you lost recently, or a long time ago, please know that you will be welcome to come and join us.

Finally, in the evening of the **21<sup>st</sup> November** there will a confirmation service held at St Bartholomew's with the bishop of Huddersfield presiding. This service will see confirmation candidates presented from parishes across our deanery and it will a service of joy and celebration.

## Walking St. Cuthbert's Way, by Martyn Crompton

This September I walked St. Cuthbert's Way together with four friends from my days at theological college in Durham. We met in 1982 and have supported each other with prayer and fellowship and by sharing an annual retreat ever since. The walk was for us a pilgrimage to give thanks to God for His love, our friendship and the privilege of over 180 years ordained ministry, shared between us.

The way runs from Melrose to Lindisfarne, a distance of some 60 miles, following the life of St. Cuthbert from Melrose Abbey where he became a monk to the Holy Island to which he returned to die. It climbs steeply out of Melrose, runs between the Eildon hills, follows the course of the beautiful river Tweed then the Roman Road, Dere Street, before climbing to high ground over Wideopen Hill, crossing the top end of the Pennine Way near Kirk Yetholm, skirting the Cheviot, passing Ad Gefrin, where St. Paulinus once baptized 3000 Northumbrians, St. Cuthbert' Cave, where legend states monks fleeing the Vikings hid with his body to descend to the coast via Fenwick and ends by crossing the sands or the causeway when exposed by the falling tide to Holy Island.

We were blessed by the weather. After torrential rain on our first afternoon, it remained fine for the rest of the week, offering us spectacular views from the high ground and it was even warm and sunny on the last day as we crossed the sands barefoot before celebrating Communion on St. Cuthbert's Island.

Each of the five of us is different. We have followed different paths in ministry in different parts of the world, from the Isle of Wight to Yorkshire, Oxford to Essex, Worcester to Wolverhampton with times in India, different parts of Africa and Bangkok. We have known and shared joys and sorrows, praying for one another for nearly 40 years and each in our own way felt blessed on our pilgrimage.

Blessing takes many forms. For me it began with simple thanksgiving to God – for the physical strength to be able to walk, not without the odd ache and pain these days, or the need to stop and look at the view when climbing hills, and enjoy the beauty of His creation. Then there was the sense of belonging by God's grace to a greater company of pilgrims, all the Christians who have walked in God's way since Jesus Himself trod this earth. This was particularly strong as we crossed the sands to Holy Island and as we knelt in prayer where St. Cuthbert himself once did. The angels and archangels felt very close. God reminded me that we never walk alone. He is always with us and so are brothers and sisters in Christ, even when they are unseen. God has a purpose for each of our lives. We can look back and see some of it, but He tells us to keep on walking, following where He leads and trusting in Him for each day as it comes until we reach the end of our journey. So my final thought expressed in my prayer on St. Cuthbert's island was that God brought each one of us there because He loves us and wants to bless us, so we can share His love with others. As my eyes followed the golden pathway traced by the setting sun across the sea to the mainland, I felt enfolded in His love, rested in His peace and was blessed indeed - ready for the next stage of the journey.

# Crafts and gifts Silent auction

Please support this event which raises money for the "Crisis" charity. There will also be a stall selling Community Cards for the Welcome Centre and a stall raising funds for The Meltham Shoe Box Project.

'Crisis' works with those in need throughout the year. Here are the stories of some of those people who have been helped:

After the lockdown Crisis got in touch to say the allowances had changed so that I could afford a bigger place. Then Crisis found this place for me. They spoke to the landlord and managed to get the rent reduced from £800 to £725. I did reference checks and credit check which I passed. Then they called me to say I was accepted. Crisis secured the bond with the letting agency. Without this I would not have been able to move in. Without Crisis I would not have been able to secure a home as the council's bidding system has closed down, leaving more people stuck. Crisis was looking everywhere for properties for me.

Crisis also arranged for a removal company to come and help me move which they paid for. Now I have a lovely two bedroomed ground floor flat with a garden in a quiet area – all neighbours lovely, ten minutes from town on the tram. Every landlord I had applied to previously had turned me down due to being on benefits. Crisis spoke to the landlord directly and vouched for me and told them I had been vetted by them and negotiated the reduction in rent. They basically argued my case. Without them I would not have known this place was coming up. Having someone reputable as Crisis backing me up made a total difference. It gave me clout. I've been in recovery for 10 months now, and if it weren't for Crisis I wouldn't have anything. I would still be struggling and fighting. I can manage on my own, but if I'm really stuck, they're there for me. If I couldn't cope with something before, the first thing I would do is turn to the bottle, but because they're here, I know I can come in for support. They keep me going. Without that, it's really hard work. Since I've been working with Crisis, and since Crisis have been working with me, I've been building my confidence back up. I'm doing a lot of talks about my experience.

**My English isn't great, and I had no idea about benefits or anything.** Luckily I had first started coming to Crisis in 2016 for help with my English and to go to some of the hatmaking classes, yoga and tai chi. When I told them about what had happened they worked with a charity called Robes who got me into their winter night shelter. Then they helped me apply for Universal Credit and found me a room in a hostel in East London in Jan 2019, where I've now been ever since.

I knew of Crisis, but I thought it was a just like a helpline. I had no idea they had a centre here in Croydon. When I found about them through the shelter I registered for every class I found remotely interesting to keep myself occupied. I also got help from the mental health and well-being coordinator. All I had was Sainsbury's bag for life with all my stuff in it with just one or two changes of clothes and I could come here in the morning and get a shower and wash them. It's also just a nice place to come and get a cup of tea and have a chat. I literally had no-one left in my life except a couple of friends, but thanks to Crisis, I had a lot of support and met a lot of people going through the same situation. I don't know how I would have coped without it to be honest. I don't think there's many days at the moment when I don't come to Crisis. We're really lucky to have it here.

If Crisis at Christmas hadn't been there, I don't know what I would have done. I would have been completely lost. Not only for a place to stay, but for the warmth and friendliness, and for all the services which were fantastic. The dental service, the hairdressers, the doctors and chiropodist. You name it. It was real relief, and I'll be working with them in the new year. I just want to get this sorted so I can focus on getting back into teaching. My hope is to get back on my feet, start teaching and contributing again. Perhaps in adult literacy or maybe immigrants who want to improve their English skills.

'It's changed my perception of what homelessness is. It's not just rough sleeping. It's ordinary people who've fallen into extraordinary circumstances.' (Quote from a volunteer)
