I would like to start by thanking everyone involved in our Christmas services this year. Christmas is a wonderful time but also a very busy time for everyone and this is especially true for the Church. All those who offer their time and gifts to help us deliver the extra services are greatly valued. I recognise that balancing the very real need to spend time with family alongside the wish to contribute towards the activities of our community is difficult and tiring. This has been a particular challenge this year in light of the fact that covid restrictions placed such restrictions on our ability to spend time with family last year.

If I were to try to thank everyone involved, I'm sure I would miss out far too many people, but I think it is appropriate to mention some who may often go unnoticed or without thanks. News from The Food Bank.

As Expected we have had a very busy Christmas at the Foodbank.

We are currently supporting about 100 families each month. I have not got the Exact number for December yet, but I am sure it will be higher.

In addition, we provided Christmas hampers to 85 families and age-appropriate presents for 124 Children.

There are too many people to thank and as always I am sure I will miss somebody, so please accept my apologies.

I need to thank our dedicated and committed team of volunteers. Who work continuously throughout the year. At Christmas the team at a busy time for them, pulled out all the stops, to meet the extra demand. I heard many stories of people going above and beyond, including one person labelling presents at 3 am.

We could not do this without the fantastic support from our community. Again I can't mention everyone but to name a few, Thank you to Morrisons Staff led by their community champion Rachel. The management and staff of both Netherton and Meltham Co-op who in addition to faithfully supporting us throughout the year, both organised Giving trees ,extra fund-raising raffles, and present collections. Meltham Convenance store and their customers raising more funds through a raffle. Staff at Meltham Dental Care, Meltham WI, and the staff at Meltham Moor primary school.

It is truly humbling to think of all the goodwill and selfless support our wonderful community gives us, not just at Christmas but throughout the year.

I now really need to appeal for more help.

Our team of volunteers have worked tirelessly throughout the pandemic. We have had to keep numbers down to keep safe. But with the demand continuing to increase and we know we are facing a massive cost of living crisis in 2022, with energy bills predicted to rise by 50% inflation at 6% and rising, interest rates rising, to name just a few. I suspect we will need to increase our opening hours.

Many of us are exhausted and can't give any more. Therefore, **we desperately need to increase our volunteers.** If you can or know anyone who can join us, please contact us via the foodbank phone or via our Facebook page. We need drivers, warehouse staff, and help with admin to name just a few of the tasks.

I am hoping to organise a volunteer training and induction event shortly. We are a friendly and supportive group, and although at times it can be challenging, it is also very rewarding.

There they Go!

On the afternoon of Tuesday 14th December 2021, we watched the lorry leave Meltham loaded with the 3471 shoeboxes from the Meltham Shoebox Team along with the shoeboxes that had already been loaded at Grimsby by the T4U team there.



This was the culmination of lots of hard work and brilliant support from the people of Meltham and surrounding areas of Yorkshire. Many people had been busy preparing and obtaining shoebox items in readiness for starting our weekly Friday morning preparation sessions, starting at the beginning of September, at St. James, Meltham Mills. From $1^{st} - 17^{th}$ November the Meltham warehouse became a hive of activity as shoeboxes were filled, and the incoming shoeboxes were checked, before being packed into large cartons. The total number of shoeboxes exceeded last year's total by over 1000 and this was a wonderful result.



As the 323 cartons, containing our Meltham shoeboxes, were being loaded onto the lorry, I spotted some of the cartons that I had personally packed with my writing on the outside. I thought that the next time someone would see that writing would be 1737 miles away in Moldova when the cartons would be being unloaded from the lorry to then be prepared for distribution.

And we can take great satisfaction in knowing just how much these shoeboxes will mean to the children who will receive them this Christmas.

We refer to the shoeboxes as being "Love in a Box" and, when the children open their shoebox, it says to them that, even though they will never know who sent the Christmas gift to them, what they do know is that someone, somewhere cares about them. And it is this that motivates us to be involved in the Meltham Shoebox Team as part of the T4U Charity



So, our work at the Meltham warehouse, based at St James Church, Meltham Mills, was all leading up to this moment, on Tuesday 14th December 2021, when the boxes left Meltham to begin their 1737-mile journey to Moldova in Eastern Europe. A journey that would end with the smiling faces of 3471 children.

It was quite an emotional moment to watch the lorry being driven out of the gates of TayTrans Ltd and along Bent Ley Road.

As Meltham Shoebox Team, lead by Judith Powell, we can look back on a very successful 2021 shoebox campaign despite the Covid-19 pandemic still rearing its ugly head.

But before we know it, after just a few weeks break, we will be planning our 2022 campaign. We always welcome new people and so, if you would like to help bring smiles to children in Eastern Europe, then we would love for you to join our team.

Carols in the Park is an integral part of the weekend that kick starts Christmas in Meltham. This year, more than most, confirmed its importance. Meltham saw the most amazing weather for the event. On Saturday, the switching on ceremony for the Christmas Lights went online as the driving rain prevented anyone physically attending the event. On Monday the deluge continued.



But Sunday 2nd December started bright and fair – but slightly

windy. By 4pm the wind had dropped and Robert Ashton Memorial Park was dry and calm for the 400 plus people who came along. This year we were celebrating the role of essential workers. Instead of readers from local schools, we had a teacher, a representative from a local care home, a nurse, Pam Cox on behalf of the local retailers and a representative from the Crossroads Meltham Foodbank. The Mayor Cllr Roberta Bampton and Rev John Dracup played key roles, the one thanking the essential workers and the other sharing the Good News of Real Love at Christmas.

We have a great working relationship with community organisations – the joint Choir from our local schools and the Meltham Community Choir sang beautifully. We are indebted to Cllr Richard Noon who helped us to find expert sound engineer who made sure everyone could hear the event and to the Town Council for a grant to help pay for the event. Meltham Crossroads made sure with a grant that there was enough money to provide a safety net for outstanding expenses. Music came from Meltham and Meltham Mills Brass Band and Simon Ball was on hand at the right moment with his skills. Richard Whiteley steered us through the Carols and Readings in his inimical style!



We had lots of volunteer stewards who gave out Morrisons Mince Pies, Carol Sheets and little organza bags containing a red heart shaped candle with the message "Real Love at Christmas – Jesus born in Bethlehem, the Light shining in the darkness." Those who came seemed keen to take them.

There was a collection for the local homeless charity Simon on the Streets and over £330 was collected.

There's nothing quite like this event anywhere else in Huddersfield – and beyond! But the most important fact is that those who come seem to enjoy it and see it as something important, even magical . And it provided a platform for Rev John to

share the message of Jesus' birth to more people than would ever now attend a Carol Service in church.

So thanks again to all who made it happen!

There is no event quite like Carols in the Pub in Meltham. If you have never been, keep your diary clear for the Saturday night in December when the Waggon and Horses is transformed!

This year, the Waggon had plenty of unsuspecting Carol singers! They may have come into the pub thinking they were meeting with their friends for a few pre-Christmas drinks. By the end of the evening they had burst their lungs singing one of the many versions of "While shepherds watched their flocks by night". One or two of them had read a reading from the Bible – Rev John simply asked for volunteers and they readers didn't come from



local churches. Three volunteers became the Kings – and did so willingly! Plus they all got a Blessing at the end of the night.



We simply couldn't do the evening without Pam and Mike letting their pub be taken over for the night. The star billing for the evening goes to Simon Ball. Every Carols in the Pub is a tour de force for him. He draws in the drinkers to become singers, not quite ready to join St Bartholomew's Choir – but not for want of trying.

"How silently this wondrous gift is given" – as there were natural breaks in the singing, quietly conversations took place with some of those present who were keen to say that they wanted more for Christmas than just presents, food and drink. And so we were pleased when one of the "volunteer" Kings came with his wife and children to the St James Crib Service on Christmas Eve. And the Waggon , the Saturday after, had its own fund raising event for Simon on the Streets, the homeless charity in Huddersfield, which raised over £200. This comes from the great relationship between the church and the community.

Jesus met people in unconventional places to tell the good news of the Kingdom. We're called to be his disciples – doing what he might have done. So come and share in the evening next December. With birds it could be anything from tiny Wrens to Gannets, (what was a Gannet doing around Meltham when it is a sea bird) and with animals it could be anything from Mice to Deer, although she no longer takes Deer as there is no room for them. There are always plenty of Hedgehogs in the hospital and she brought one along for us to see up close. If they don't get up to a certain weight, they won't survive hibernation, so she has to feed and look after them until Spring. The centre is run by volunteers and they depend on donations to function, but they are dedicated to do their best for wildlife. Kath is a very interesting and passionate speaker who will go to any lengths to save wildlife.

Our annual Carol Service and lunch was held on the 7th December in Helme Church. With the worries of 'have we enough food' and a church with no proper heating, there was also storm Barra to contend with as well. Luckily the storm came later in the day and the weather was OK. 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SHOPPING IN THE PANDEMIC by Pam Murgatroyd

When abroad, the Brits are known as a 'nation of queuers', which probably resulted from the war when we queued for rationed produce. Foreigners just elbow their way to the front.

The pandemic brought this all back to us, especially when only food shops were open and eating was a necessity. In the early days, many of the shelves in the supermarkets were empty due to short supplies. There was a shortage of toilet rolls, pasta, rice, tinned food, tissues, soap, flour and as a result, some of these products were rationed when they came back into stock. To make it worse, the over 70's were advised to stay home and not to go shopping themselves but have their groceries delivered to the door. You could ring an order in on one day and it would be delivered the next day. I was lucky and always got exactly what I ordered from Morrisons in Meltham, but some were not as fortunate and received "substitutions".
