Letter from your Vicar.

Whilst making a big budget Hollywood film the crew went on location in the desert. One day an elderly local gentleman approached the director and said, "tomorrow there will be rain", the next days filming was a wash out. A couple of weeks later the same elderly gentleman again approached the director and said, "tomorrow their will be a storm" and the next day came strong winds and hail. The director was so impressed that he had the local gentleman put on the payroll.

A few weeks later they were due to film "the big scene" so the director sent for the gentleman who had not been seen since being put on the payroll to ask if the weather would be favourable. The local man smiled at the director and said, "don't ask me, I don't know, my radio is broken".

The weather and predicting the future!

Whilst the weather has recently been atrocious with a succession of named storms Meltham does appear to have escaped the worst of it so far, and I'm happy to say that our Churches seem to have suffered nothing worse than a few slipped slates. I said so far because nobody can really say what might be around the corner. I remember that in my farming days I spent large amounts of time looking at weather forecasts, however, I never cut grass for hay, I would mow the grass and decide a few days later (hopefully sunny ones) if we had made hay or something else.

The New Year has been an exciting time for the Crossroads Project. The Shop has been busy and is now developing new ideas and projects. Working even more closely with Uniform Exchange we are now selling more school uniforms at very cheap prices to ensure that those who need them can afford them. Families requiring full uniforms can still obtain them free from Uniform exchange.

Instead of eBay shopping new clothing that has been donated is now sold at slightly higher but still affordable prices, this seems to be going down well.



The Project has joined forces with Kirklees to be part of the Community Anchor Networks which are helped to support other community groups and organisations to sustain and develop community activities contributing to health and wellbeing. It is about 'making a difference' and working with others.

This is something we have always tried to do by selling affordable goods in the Shop, giving Grants to individuals and groups, and offering free accommodation in the Centre for those who need it.

The Foodbank continues to be busy, and we are delighted to welcome new drivers and volunteers.

Meltham Food Bank

- Much more than a can of baked beans!

Recently I took the opportunity via a Crossroads open day to go and have a look at the foodbank and what great things it offers to the community.

Patrice Curtis - Storey took the time and showed me around, the recent renovations really do help brighten the place up. There are about 100 families the foodbank are supporting each month with food parcels and other toiletries too. The volunteers who help have a real heart to help others and are a jolly bunch who work well together getting parcels ready or help delivering where needed.

The foodbank are always happy to receive donations big and small, whether it be directly to them or in the bins at the Coop in Meltham or Netherton. You can also buy a foodbank bag at Morrisons which gets distributed around the local foodbanks, including the one here in Meltham.

While I was there, it stuck me that the foodbank is not all about baked beans and pasta but about long life Semi skimmed milk in cartoons and shampoo and shower gel too. This was echoed in our own household, when I realised whilst putting the kids to bed I should have bought more toothpaste that day and didn't so I had to help squeeze the last dregs out of the tube, and again the following morning just so the kids could clean their teeth. It made me realise that this is what some families in our community are facing more often, making things last that one more time, putting off the inevitable.

So can you help? The previous page and the pictures bellow gives examples of the types of items the foodbank are short of. Thank you to all those who already support the foodbank whenever you can, but next time you are in the supermarket, instead of picking up those cans of baked beans or packets of pasta, why not pick up an extra jar, can or packet of something of what you are short of instead?

Fairtrade Fortnight

Fairtrade Fortnight 2022 began on 21st February and ends on 6th March. During this time individuals, groups and companies come together to celebrate the people in developing countries who grow our food, but are often underpaid and exploited. This year the focus of Fairtrade Fortnight is climate



change and the growing problems this poses to farmers and workers within the Fairtrade community. Climate change is a huge challenge for farmers with drought, crop diseases, floods, heatwaves and shrinking harvests among the obstacles faced by producers in countries who have contributed least to the causes of climate change.

We have supported Traidcraft for a number of years in this Parish. Traidcraft is the original Fairtrade pioneer in the UK. It was founded in 1979 by a group of Christians who wanted to challenge the deep injustices in global trade. 




I went for a pelican curry last night, it was quite nice but the bill was enormous.

He also received a jar filled with messages of thanks from people who have benefited from his teaching, creativity, friendship, support and prayers throughout his many years of service.



God bless you Peter and thank you.








