GOING GREENER - Moving towards an Eco Church

I do hope everyone has enjoyed the lovely long summer and the very hot weather. The words - 'Phew, what scorcher' never rang more true!!

But of course, just in case we were actually enjoying ourselves, we were **constantly** being reminded by all media sources, that the record breaking temperatures, with the subsequent parched landscape, terrifying wild fires and drought conditions have all largely come about because of global warming and climate change. Let's hope and pray all world leaders, Governments and captains of industry continue to take Climate Change seriously.

I rather suspect, that like me, when faced with the prospect of enormous utility bills landing on our doormats or inbox, all this 'Going Green' and trying to live a more sustainable lifestyle can seem a bit of a luxury!

However, if 'Going Greener' can help me to save money, I shall persevere! I'm still enjoying my first bottle of Ecover laundry liquid – excellent value for money. I'm not so keen on the fabric conditioner, I miss the fragrances of lilies, strawberries lavender, fresh cotton etc!

To encourage church folk and others in their Green efforts, the Anglican Diocese of Leeds has produced an excellent document – **52 Eco Top Tips -** handily written to cover each month of the year. I am sharing few tips which appeared for August and September.

In the car (if you can still afford the fuel!) – 1. Drive Off immediately when starting from cold – idling to heat the engine wastes fuel and causes rapid engine wear. 2. When driving, typically the most efficient speed is around 55 – 65mph. Slow down and allow a little more time for journeys. 3. Switch your engine off if you pull over or are stuck in traffic. It will save fuel, reduce nitrous oxide pollution for you and for those round you and reduce noise!

This all sounds rather like the BBC's public service broadcasts, very popular in the 50's and 60's!

Lighting your home – 1.If you replace all light bulbs with LED it will, on average save you £35 pa (after initial outlay of maybe £100) 2.Use natural light when you can to save energy –sit by the window to read! Of course your windows are now draught free! 3. Turn the lights off when you're not using them! 4. If you have lights in the garden – try and use solar power, they don't use electricity.

Do with these tips as you will – they may be really helpful. We can but try!

LIFEBOATS ??? MELTHAM ???

Meltham has always been a staunch centre of support, ever since the day the Late Allan Dixon of Mill Moor Road became a regional organiser (Manager) for the RNLI.

The Lifeboat Service today now costs in the region of £196 million pounds every year, all of which is provided by voluntary contributions, from a variety of sources, not least of which are events such as we were permitted to hold in your church hall on Saturday 6th August 2022. The proceeds amounted to almost £700, which is remarkable from a small village event.

On behalf of the RNLI I wish to offer sincere thanks to all involved, To the church for the opportunity, The ladies who provided a wealth of totally healthy cakes, The Ladies who provided, the gift stall, the tombola, and the handmade Christmas Cards. The local shops who provided the ingredients, and of course all those who worked so hard on the day serving coffee and washing up. and of course the people who attended and supported the event and who made generous contributions.

Yes we still save lives at Sea (See BBC2) but we also have dedicated flood rescue teams, for when disaster strikes any part of our community. We have specially trained lifeguards keeping our children and holiday makers safe on our sunny beaches. Along with a special training and lifesaving team who work all over the world in deprived areas where loss of life is frequent and unnecessary.

The RNLI does all that we can to save and preserve life, be that of a child in danger in an inflatable dinghy, or a dog that has fallen down a cliff face, This takes place 365 days a year, regardless of weather and conditions. **LIFEBOATS ? - MELTHAM?** Yes we are there for you often in ways that you may not appreciate.





The Eleanor Hirst Trust



The Eleanor Hirst Trust own six stunning Grade II listed Almshouses in the pretty village of Wilshaw. The Trust's aims are set out in the 1870 will of Eleanor Hirst which are solely to maintain and preserve the Almshouses for the benefit of elderly, low-income residents.

Dan Bamforth is Trustee and Chairman of the Trust, along with Trustee Hilary Livingstone.

In 1831 Eleanor Ramsey married Joseph Hirst, as a wedding present they were given an old disused stone quarry. Joseph then started to build his own little empire – within the village of Wilshaw and the land around it. His business went from strength to strength. Joseph built a mill, a warehouse, weaving rooms, a counting house and a row of cottages for his workers.

Eleanor and Joseph had one child, Mary. By 1842 when Mary was 10 years old, Joseph's schemes were prospering so much that he needed to expand, and he found a place to rent at Meltham Mills. The operation grew and grew. In 1853 he extended his production by renting a mill at Royd Edge. He eventually bought this mill and enlarged it considerably. Joseph gained a solid reputation throughout England and many parts of the world as a first-class fancy woollen manufacturer.

Tragedy struck in June 1859 when their daughter, Mary, died during childbirth – just a year after she married. She was buried in the churchyard at Meltham Mills. Joseph and Eleanor decided to build a church at Wilshaw and a family mausoleum in the churchyard. Mary's body was eventually exhumed and taken to its new resting place in the mausoleum. In 1871 Joseph purchased Upper Greave, which had been a tiny hamlet, followed by St Mary's Court which was built by Joseph in 1873 and named after his daughter. These are replicas of houses seen by Joseph when he exhibited cloth at the Crystal Palace in 1851. It was Eleanor's idea as a memorial for her daughter and in 1879 the six Almshouses were built. Mary had been an affectionate young lady who had a lot of love and sympathy for the poor of the village, wanting to provide comfort in their declining years.

Eleanor lived until 1881, some seven years after her husband's death, they had no direct descendants to take over the woollen business and the mill closed. Eleanor was laid to rest alongside her husband, Joseph and daughter, Mary in the family mausoleum in Wilshaw.

The Eleanor Hirst Trust has been transformed by Dan and Hilary over recent years. Sadly, because of financial difficulties the Trust had to sell several assets to raise much needed funds to refurbish the Almshouses which included new windows (70+all unique in size), roof and chimney repairs, electrical wiring, stonework, tree work, landscaping, drainage etc. The Trustees have worked hard with the support of the Charity Commission and especially the Almshouse Association to both modernise and run efficiently the Trust to secure its future whilst achieving the objectives set out in the will of the late Eleanor Hirst.

Daily Prayer podcast celebrates 1,000th episode


A free service bringing the ancient monastic cycle of daily prayer to millions of modern listeners has recently broadcast its 1,000th episode.




