

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






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Letter from your Vicar

Recently the Parish had it's Annual Parochial Church Meeting, here is the letter Rev'd John wrote to encourage us all as we continue to help 'sow the good seed'.

Sow good seed and sow it generously.

In his parables Jesus often used images from farming to help those listening to understand how the kingdom of God works. These parables were used to give warnings and explanations but most often they were intended to offer encouragement and hope.

Several of these parables ask us to consider seeds. The tiny mustard seed that grows into a great tree like plant, the four soils in which some seed fails to grow, and the one in which an enemy sows' weeds in the same field as good seed. The simplest is in Mark 4:26-29, the farmer sows, the seed grows, ripens, and provides a harvest. In modern farming and in the many books available on Church growth we are encouraged to ask many complicated questions which "may" be relevant. However, Jesus only seems to ask, "did you sow good seed?" and "did you sow generously?"

The farmer in Mark 4 doesn't understand how it all works but, because he sowed the seed he can expect a harvest, he has hope.

Many people will have seen recent reports in the national media about Church of England attendance numbers. There is no shortage of doom and gloom if they are taken at face value, and they are a source of concern regardless of how we look at them. Nationally, there was a decline of 20% between 2009 and 2019, and our most up to date figures show a further post pandemic decline of 30% since 2019. Of course, some Churches have fared better than this, but others have fared worse.

We must take this situation seriously as our own parish is clearly not immune to the same long-term trends. However, we have had the joy and encouragement of seeing new people join our Churches which must give us good reason for continued hope.

If we want a harvest, we must sow good seed and sow it generously. I'm confident that this is God's message for the whole Church but more importantly I'm confident that this is God's message for the Churches of our parish right now.

Sowing the seed

Our Parish has a long tradition of engaging with the needs and activities of the community and this has prepared the ground well, but we must not forget to sow the seed of the gospel.

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Over the last couple of years, we have begun putting together a variety of new, fun events and activities. Having fun is essential if we are to engage with a new group of people, particularly younger people, but it's not just about fun. Many have been centred around key events within the Christian calendar and in all cases, we are clear that what we are doing we are doing as Church and in the name of Jesus.

A considerable number of people have engaged with these events and new relationships are beginning to form showing the seeds can grow. It is true that not all these people will wish to join our Churches, but some may, and all should continue to be welcome.

I am enormously grateful to everyone who has helped to make this year a success. Especially our Church Wardens, PCC, and steering group members, and a very big thank you to all who are involved in leading and enabling our worship and many parish activities.

I often wish I could name everybody individually but that would not only make this report extremely long, but I also fear that I would inevitably miss someone and that it may be of those wonderful people who work tirelessly in the background. I'm sure everyone would like to offer their thanks to all of those people, including all those involved in finance, safeguarding, admin, and technology. All these people and many more play an essential part in sowing the seed and caring for it as it grows.

Please be assured that your contribution is greatly valued by myself, and by God.



Crossroads Foodbank News

We like showing people round our premises... The slicker we become, the more confident we get in explaining to visitors that we're doing it right. This involves taking a new request over the phone, giving the benefit of the doubt to anyone telling us that they're in need, and explaining that we'll be engaging with them in

the future to see if we can help them address issues which led to them approaching us. It's vital that we do this for two reasons. Firstly, we rely on charitable donations from locals, and if we don't exercise good stewardship of their money, these may dry up. Secondly, we'll never have the resources to support all potential clients all of the time.

Earlier this month, Mayor of West Yorkshire Tracy Brabin came to the Centre, in order to see how people manage with rising prices that her Mayor's Cost of Living Fund was helping out with. Although primarily here to see the facilities of the Centre, she spent time meeting volunteers beavering away in our warehouse, expressing a genuine interest in our operation, and spending over an hour with us. Charles III is popping by in the next fortnight... Only kidding – he's not coming until June !

Pride prevents many from coming forward, so it's necessary to go the extra mile in reaching out to people who are reticent in asking for support. A benefactor purchased a supply of varied goodies, school heads told us about certain households with children who may be struggling this Easter, so we delivered



modest bags of treats, and made them aware that we're here to help them.

Life goes on, and we still have to appeal for foodstuffs, so we were at Morrison's on April Fools' Day asking for items. Spring had sprung, and we were overwhelmed by the public response – it's a chance for our willing helpers to meet and talk to the fount of kindness that our community is. We're so glad we're here in Meltham...

<u>GOING GREENER -</u> Moving towards an Eco Church

The tadpoles in our small wild life pond are growing legs – they will soon be frogs!

Local allotments are being well prepared by their diligent workforce. There really are few things as satisfying as planting seeds and watching the seedlings and delicate young plants turn into lovely summer salads and gorgeous fruit and veg! Even if you don't have a vegetable patch, let alone an allotment, it's still quite easy to grow simple salad leaves and tomatoes in pots on the patio or decking. You'll enjoy them all the more knowing you have grown them yourself!

BBC Radio 2 has been running an excellent series, Let's Get Growing, to encourage everyone to get out and have a grow!! When we work hand in hand with nature and see the wonderful results, we do indeed praise our loving generous God for all His bounty!

Please, please make sure that any chemicals you use in the garden are kind to pets and to wild life. Slug pellets can cause such harm to hedgehogs. Check the labels carefully! Please be *very* sparing with weed killer. Doesn't the humble dandelion or buttercup deserve its day in the sun? Don't forget to leave some natural corners for wild life to flourish! More wild corners mean less digging!

It seems so much easier to think 'green' when the days are longer and the weather is warmer. Thermostats can be turned right down; much less energy is needed to keep us warm and clean; the sausage dog draught excluders can go back under the stairs for a few months!

Solar panels can really get on with 'doing their thing' - converting the heat of the sun into electricity! Even the mighty wind turbines look elegant and stately whirling their vast blades in the bright sunlight on the hillsides.

And let us not forget.... one more reason for optimism is that our new King, Charles the Third, has been a champion of all things Green for very many years. He has worked tirelessly persuading the world to live more sustainably; to farm organically; to protect our beautiful world and to care for all its wild life from the smallest insects to the greatest giants of land and sea. 
Time To Read

Flipped - Life in the upside down Kingdom By Malcolm Duncan, SPCK, £7.99

Flipped is the official theme book for Spring Harvest 2023.

Christians are called to model a way of life that challenges the status quo and infuses the world with hope and possibility. We are to be people who see possibility where others see failure, beauty where others see ugliness and freedom where others see chains.



This is the Upside Down Kingdom, where the forgotten are noticed, the silenced are given back their voice and love is stronger than hate.

By exploring the teaching of Jesus, as recorded in the Gospel of Matthew, Malcolm Duncan in Flipped traces the key components of this new community, this lifegiving way of living. He explores the five key discourses in Matthew and invites us to a radical new way of living and being centred around the reign and the rule of King Jesus.

The message is one that our churches need to hear - that God's Kingdom is unshakeable, local churches are its vanguard and Christians are its citizens.

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ST BARTHOLOMEW'S CHOIR REPORT - 2022



Things have been a little more normal this year following the Covid pandemic, though the new normal is not really the same as the pre-pandemic times. The lower number of choristers we now have left in the choir has meant it has been difficult to rehearse routinely and singing every week has not been possible – you could say we are now more of

an 'occasional choir' and no longer have sufficient voices in each of the 4 parts to be able to sing the anthems and other items like we used to. As with many church choirs, we are particularly short of men, of which there are now only 3 remaining.

After the cancellation of the planned rendition of Stainer's Crucifixion in 2020, it was great to be able to finally sing it once more on Good Friday. As has been the case for a few years now, the choir was augmented with a number of additional voices for which we were grateful and we had a number of new faces too who joined us for the first time.

We were sad to lose one of our members; Geoff Crowther sadly passed away earlier in the year. Geoff had sung with us for many years both in the bass and tenor sections of the choir though hadn't been able to join us regularly since the pandemic due to ill health. We managed to get a good choir together to sing for his funeral, and also to sing at the funerals of two of our former members, Hadyn Webster and Norman Webb who also passed away at the back end of the year. We miss all those people who sang with us in years gone by, and it is good to still be able to hear their voices when we use the hymns from our CD recordings in the services.

Following the retirement of Walter Young, we decided to make a donation of £250 to the guide dogs charity. This was to give thanks for the 5 guide dogs that Walter had with him whilst singing in the choir over the years.

Going forward, it's hard to see whether choir will grow or just diminish further. Times have changed, and though we have had glimpses of the 'old times' this year when we have had lots of extra helpers in the choir, getting people to commit to anything on a regular basis is challenging, and nobody is getting any younger either. We may have to start to think (and pray) about what the future might look like for the singing and music here at St Bartholomew's.



As always, we would welcome new additions to the choir - potential new members should however not feel they have to commit to singing every week or even wearing a robe for that matter!

Everlasting God, we pray for our new King. Bless his reign and the life of our nation. Help us to work together so that truth and justice, harmony and fairness flourish among us; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.




