Letter from your Vicar

This month we will remember and celebrate the lives of two of our parish's great influences. People who have in their own different ways served God in this place with great commitment, faithfulness, and sacrifice.

Peter Rolls' Funeral will be held on Saturday 16th September at 11:30am in St James Church. Peter was one of the kindest and most faith "filled" people it has ever been my joy to meet. Whilst he was a member of St James Church his influence, pastoral care, and wisdom has benefited our entire parish for many years. I'm sure that the only thing that will be felt more strongly than the sadness of his passing will be the gratitude we share for God having given him to our parish for so many years.

Dorothy Turner's Funeral will be held on Thursday 21st September at 12:00pm in St Bartholomew's Church. As the wife of one of David Turner who was vicar of this parish during the 1990's I know that Dorothy also served this parish with great devotion. She was caring and always considered others before herself. I am very aware that the work and sacrifices of my own wife can easily be noticed less than those of "the vicar". Surely the value of the service and sacrifice of people like Dorothy should never be understated or underestimated.

In my last letter I asked you to consider Moses and how he faithfully led God's people, trusting in God's plan for the future, in God's ability to provide all that the people of Israel would need. I ask you to consider him once again but also Joshua. Moses himself never had the joy of setting foot in the promised land, the privilege of leading God's people across the Jordan was given to Joshua. Yet even as they crossed the river, they began setting up memorials (Joshua Chapter 4). These memorials were of course, rightly to honour God but I cannot imagine that they did not also remember Moses and thank God for him.

So, God's people took possession of the land flowing with milk and honey. I wish that I could tell you that from this point on everything went smoothly, that things became easy for them, but the truth is there were still a great many challenges ahead.

I also wish that I could tell you that we are now destined to enjoy a similar period of God's blessing. But I do not have any particular promise from God that this is such a time. However, most of the rest of the book of Joshua and the book of Judges tells of how every time that God's people turned to him, he helped them and blessed them. And, that the good news of the Gospel tells us that we, God's people, should always live by and trust in the abundant grace of his blessings.

As we pray for the thriving of the Church here in Meltham, and trust in the amazing grace of our loving God for what might be to come, we should not forget those who have been a source of God's blessing to us in the past.

Stephen (Steve) Asquith and Ruth Murray-Webster were both admitted as churchwardens by the Archdeacon in July. We promised to do a few things and we thought it would be good to share those here:

- To work with the vicar and PCC to further the mission of God and his purposes in the world
- To undertake this task as a spiritual and holy calling, seeking in word and action to promote unity and peace
- To care for the fabric and property of the church, as stewards of God.

We prayed to be given the grace to serve with joy, humility and strength, as witnesses to the gospel of Christ and to build up the kingdom and his Church.

The great thing is that, although we both work full-time as well as this volunteering, we work at different times of the week – so Steve is able to support Wednesday services and Ruth is able to support Sundays. And we have active steering groups for both St Bart's Church and the Church Hall to assist as well as the work of our finance officers for church and the church hall.

On Sundays we are blessed by the services of two wonderful musicians in Simon and Jean, a talented group of people who read the word and a variety of services supported by our worship leaders and readers as well as our ordained ministers.

Gone are the days of 'one size fits all'. We know that some people love to worship with organ, choir, sung gloria and traditional hymns. We know that others really enjoy learning new songs and engaging with a different style of worship. Going forward we plan to communicate more clearly what to expect when – then you can choose.

We know we can't please all the people all the time, but we pray that God will fill you with the enthusiasm to worship him sincerely and faithfully, and with great tolerance of those who might be different to you.

CROSSROADS CENTRE





Volunteering at the foodbank is mostly hard work taking phone requests, packing food parcels and delivering them to clients. However, all work and no play makes Jack a dull boy, so it's good

to have some occasional light relief. Early in July, this took the form of a Crossroads entry in "It's a knockout", held on Broadlands Rec, with the proceeds being split between



ourselves and Meltham Wildlife Rescue. Sadly, our

demographic is mostly of retirement age, and the athletic prowess that we once possessed has faded a little, but we more than made up for this in enthusiasm and



joie de vivre. We managed to cobble together a team of 10 including Anne and myself, without resort to bribery or the press gang, and what a team! (It may be politic to gloss over the fact that we roped in three of Janet Rockett's teenage granddaughters for the day...). The Weather Gods looked kindly on us, and we got stuck in to a variety of challenges, mostly

involving vast inflatable structures, and soapy water. Considering that we were up against some fitness groups and an amateur football side, we came a creditable fifth out of eleven, and raised north of £900. The added bonus was that we had so much fun doing it, and got clean into the bargain...

It's a quiet time here at the foodbank, as it's the holiday season, so it's a good time to look at whether things are running as they should be. We pride ourselves in trying to address the root causes of why clients come to us, which is important for two reasons: We'd prefer it if our clients are helped back on their feet, as dependency helps no-one in the long run. The other reason is that we rely on acts of kindness from our benefactors, and have to exercise good stewardship of their donations. It's often said that if you send money to the poorest regions of Africa, some of it will be spent on building swimming pools for dictators. The foodbank has a duty of care to do our damnedest to make sure we target our resources to those most in need. In the last couple of months, Anne our Warehouse Manager, has been working closely with Chris, our Debt/Benefit Adviser, to engage meaningfully with new clients, and it's paying off.

Although we shouldn't exist in 2023, we do, and we'll be there as long as there's need in our area. Thank you all for the donations that keep us going.

On the 20th June we all woke to torrential rain, so when we met at Blackmoorfoot Reservoir it was a case of discussing what to do. Nobody wanted to get wet (which we would have done had we gone on our walk) so it was decided to go to Hinchliffes for coffee. We whiled away the time drinking and gossiping until it was time to go for lunch which was booked at the Sands House. We had a lovely lunch and the gossip kept on going, we all enjoyed our day despite the rain. When we left to make our way home the rain was still pouring down.

What a surprise, the forecast was for showers on our next walk on 4th July. This was in the Netherton and South Crosland area, so plenty of open spaces in which to get wet. The ladies met outside the Beaumont Arms, where we were having lunch later, then took field paths across to South Crosland where we added a loop along tracks and back to South Crosland. We had a very light shower while crossing the fields and then sunshine for the rest of the walk. We now had plenty of time to wander down the road and back to the Beaumont Arms. We have been there a few times before so we knew the food would be good. All I will say is that we were not disappointed and had a good lunch along with plenty of chat. Another successful walk from our summer programme.

Is the weather going to get better? Our next walk on Tuesday 18th July was along the canal from Marsden to Slaithwaite with lunch at the Vanilla Bean Café. Unfortunately, I could not be there for this walk so I am making this up from what I was told by those who were there. They set off from Marsden in lovely sunny weather and it didn't start raining until they got to Slaithwaite. There were lots of huge puddles along the canal towpath so they had lots of fun jumping and skipping in them (going back to childhood comes to mind). On arriving in Slaithwaite they found the bollards had all got knitted hats on top, a very colourful display.

On to the Vanilla Bean for lunch where the lovely food was served by pleasant and friendly staff. That is all I have been told but they did all have a lovely time.

The walk on August 1st (Yorkshire Day) was up through Slate Pits Woods to Meltham Reservoir. The weather was forecast for sunshine and showers and when the showers came they were just drizzle (moor grime in these parts), you couldn't feel them under the trees. We set off up the track which was in very good condition considering all the rain we have had. There was plenty of water in the reservoir and plenty of wildlife on it, various breeds of duck, lots of Canada Geese and a family of Swans, Mum, Dad and five cygnets. The flora was very abundant as well, the Holly will look wonderful when all the berries turn red, lots of berries on the Mountain Ash and the Honeysuckle was full of flowers as it climbed up the trunks of trees. We returned to our cars, which had been parked up the Knowle and drove round to the Golf Club for lunch. We ate our lunch whilst watching the Golfers, rabbits and squirrels playing on the golf course.

What a wonderful day for our last walk of the summer on August 15th, we were all hoping that the weather would behave itself. We met in Carlile Street car park then car shared to Castle Hill where we parked in the layby on Lumb Lane. I hope we don't have to climb those steps was the cry from one of the ladies. I told her not to worry as I knew a better way to the top. We left the cars and headed down the road for a few yards then turned left onto a track, this takes you around the bottom of Castle Hill. Along here, in the sunshine, we enjoyed looking out for the flowers and fruit growing alongside. The birds will have a feast in winter with sloes, blackberries, holly and we even found some Hazel Nuts. Another left turn and it was the final climb to the summit, a more gentle climb up this side, and with all the stops to look at the views t didn't feel very difficult. When we reached the top we found the wind, it had been hiding, but it was beautiful with the far-reaching views. We could see the windmills on Cold Edge, between Halifax and Haworth, to the right we could make out the North York moors and left up to Holme Moss and West Nab. Closer there was Huddersfield before us with the Town Hall easy to see and we spent ages picking out places we knew. We walked up to the Tower then back to the cars down the road and on to Farnley Tyas for lunch at the Golden Cock. This had been booked in advance and was very good, served by two pleasant girls who had difficulty in making themselves heard over all the gossip that was going around.



St Bartholomew's Organ Repairs and Choir Notes

We have recently had some work undertaken on the organ at St Bartholmew's to hopefully keep it going for a few more years yet. Built in 1926 by Huddersfield based organ builders Peter Conacher & Co. it is approaching the grand old age of 100 years old and having last had major cleaning and maintenance work over 30 years ago back in 1989, it has been long overdue some TLC. Gradually over the years we have lost a few notes up the top end (fortunately ones that are not used too often) and various wind leaks have occurred as the leather work has started to perish in places due to its age. In the main the organ has continued to work reasonably well but this has mainly been due to various thing being 'patched up' by the organist over the years using such things as blu-tac, gaffer tape and bits of paper!

The organ is of an age where in an ideal world, a full refurbishment would be undertaken which would include a full clean and overhaul along with electrification and modernisation of the pneumatic action. The cost to do such work however would probably be in the region of £100,000 which in the current climate is neither feasible or justifiable. We therefore spent a small amount from the organ fund to have some minor repair work done to fix the current leaks and try to get all the notes working again - this involved having some leather work repaired and some of the pneumatic action piping replaced. We enlisted this work to Jardine Organ Company from Manchester who spent a couple of days in August doing the required work. They used to look after the fine Jardine organ at St James' Meltham Mills up until its sad demise following a roof leak back in 2008 and were pleased to undertake some work again over this side of the hill again and reacquaint themselves with Meltham.

I would like to thank anyone who has contributed to the organ fund over the years that has enabled us to have this work carried out. The work was successful, and we now have the major air leaks fixed and all notes working (barring 1 which was unfortunately inaccessible without further dismantling work).

We had a special meeting of the remaining choir members recently to decide how we might move forward with the choir at St Bartholomew's. Whilst acknowleding that times have changed both in terms of service patterns and number of

remaining choir members, we agreed that we were keen to at least try and get back into some kind of regular pattern of singing. One problem we have is that unless pretty much everyone is available, it is difficult to have an effective choir that can lead the singing. We discussed various options but ultimately decided that we would commit to singing on one Sunday every month and rehearse the Thursday prior. In addition to this we will also try and get a choir together with additional helpers for special services. As things stand, we shall therefore have a choir on the 3rd Sunday of each month. As always, we would be delighted to welcome anyone who would like to join us for a sing - it is no longer a weekly commitment like it has been perceived to be previously, so please do get in touch with any member of the choir or myself if you feel you can help us out occasionally.

The Alpha Course

Have you ever thought to yourself - I've been going to church for years but I've never really got to grips with questions like:

Who is Jesus?,
Why did he die for us?
How can we have faith?
How does God guide us?
Why do we pray?



If God loves us, why is there so much pain in the world?

Alpha is a space to ask the big questions like theses and explore faith in an open, pressure-free environment.

The Course is made up of a series of sessions exploring the Christian faith, typically run over eight to eleven weeks. Each talk looks at a different question around faith and is designed to create conversation. The Alpha episodes are designed to engage and inspire conversation. They're about thirty minutes long and explore the big issues around faith and unpack the basics of Christianity.

Probably the most important part of any Alpha is the chance to share thoughts and ideas on the topic, and simply discuss it in a small group. There's no obligation to say anything and there's nothing you can't say (seriously). It's an opportunity to hear from others and contribute your own perspective in an honest, friendly and open environment.

If you think you might be interested but want to know more before committing yourself to do it, there's a number of people you can ask who have done the course – and who have really benefitted from it. For some it's really changed their life; for others, it's quietly strengthened their faith.

For the last two years, starting in Autumn the Parish has run two Alpha Courses. One of them has been face to face lead by Captain John Smith at the Crossroads Centre in the evening and one has been online using Zoom lead by Nigel Priestley. People of faith and no faith have come along. It's for people of all ages and with widely different backgrounds.

And if there's someone you've always wanted to share your faith with but didn't know how to, then a Alpha is perfect place to do so. Bring them along.


