

Are you dreaming of a green Christmas? Part 2

How are we all doing? I must confess I am finding it quite a challenge to keep thinking 'green' while the festive season is almost upon us! It's just too easy to slip back into old habits acquired over a lifetime of stuffing stockings with cheerful plastic and lots of sparkle! But hopefully we are gaining knowledge and knowledge brings confidence! So here are a few tips and hints to help us have a great Christmas Day whilst not causing too much damage to our planet – Good luck!

Christmas Dinner: Plan a sustainable dinner by choosing locally sourced, organic ingredients, plant based or low-impact meat options, and incorporate seasonal produce that hasn't been flown half way round the world! Use reusable dinnerware and cloth napkins and table covers instead of disposable. Consider energy efficient cooking methods like a slow cooker or air fryer. Watch portion sizes to avoid waste and compost scraps instead of throwing them away! Lastly don't forget the eco friendly washing up liquid and cleaning stuff!!

Gifts for children: Consider giving eco friendly toys made from sustainable materials, such as wooden puzzles or organic cotton stuffed animals. Educational gifts like books on nature or DIY science kits promote learning and sustainability. Another idea is a reusable lunch box set or a stainless steel water bottle for school. Encourage outdoor activities with gardening kits or birdhouse building materials. Opt for items with minimal packaging to reduce waste.

Gifts for grownups: Consider eco-friendly gift options like attractive reusable shopping bags, sustainable kitchenware or indoor plants. Bigger presents: ask what people would really like – it saves expensive mistakes and disappointed faces! Use recycled or reusable wrapping paper; encourage the children to print on brown wrapping paper with Christmas printing stamps and use coloured string or raffia to tie them. Opt for energy- efficient LED lights for decorations. Encourage 'Experiences' rather than physical gifts, a theatre visit; a cookery course; an exciting outdoors activity - create memories.

Finally how about buying a family gift, something that comes out every Christmas, something that your children, grandchildren and great grandchildren will treasure over the years - a beautiful traditional Nativity Set? Such a gift would put Mary, Joseph, their precious baby, our Lord Jesus, along with angels, shepherds and kings, at the heart of the family Christmas. God's greatest gift to the world, sending us His Son, celebrated every Christmas.

Have a joyful, peaceful and very Happy Christmas and, of course, a Greener New Year!

So what are we going to do... Our volunteers will be helping out until the last minute knowing that it's a tidy break until normal life resumes in early January. Our phone line will be manned for emergencies during this period. Also, we've approached the amazing Liz Woodfield from Meltham Moor Primary, who's liaising with the other heads and providing us with contacts for families who'd welcome an extra boost with Xmas treat packs delivered by our drivers just before the break. This will help us to engage with households who may have been reticent in coming forward in the past, and that's vital – it's what we have to do. It's 2023 in an affluent and developed state not afflicted by wars, so no-one should go hungry, full stop.

Please dig deep for us this Christmas – you did last Christmas, Harvest Festival time, and as an ongoing thing throughout the year – it's needed more than ever, and it encapsulates what the true Christmas message is all about.

Magazine changes ahead

Whilst helping to sort some paperwork at St Bartholomew's Church I was excited to come across the first ever edition of this monthly church magazine back in 1900. It was interesting to read what was happing then, but also relieved to see that in 1917 the first line written in April was, "My Dear Friends, I am afraid the Magazine is very late this month, but I am sure you will excuse it when you realise the rush I have been living in lately." See, it's not just me!

This next year in 2024, is the year the magazine will become **bi-monthly**. It will be issued every 'even' month as in February, April, June, August, October and December. This is due to many reasons, but namely the cost of printing has increased. This is in part due to Kirklees college stopping their subsidised service, but also the fact printing is a high energy consuming business. The Parish Magazine has been running at a loss every month. To help cover these costs, the magazine from February, will increase to £1 per issue. The price has not increased for at least 20+ years put the cost of producing it has.

However, if you are a subscriber and pay your £5 yearly subscription, this will NOT change. So in effect you will be getting an issue for FREE!

A letter from the Rt Revd Nick Baines

The diocese has requested that the following letter to be included in all parish magazines across the diocese.



Dear Friends

I want to start with a big thank you to all those who give their money generously, individually and through their parishes, which pays the parish share. I know that for many that is very challenging.

Your parish share not only supports the clergy you see week in and week out, but also supports 310 clergy and curates right across the diocese. Share ensures we can provide them with suitable housing. Share lets us provide training, resources and guidance to over 32,000 worshipers in 441 parishes. Share enabled over 10,000 life events in our parishes last year alone.

Parish Share has a far reaching impact.

For every £100 that the diocese receives in parish share, it spends £133 on paying for clergy and ministry. Your parish share is vital for sustaining ministry and mission across the Diocese of Leeds.

But we face a very real challenge. Parish share income has fallen by £1.5 million since 2019. At the same time, costs associated with parish ministry and the maintenance of clergy housing have increased by roughly the same amount of £1.5 million, due to the increased cost of living and materials. The Diocese cannot continue to spend significantly more than we can bring in.

At the root of Christian giving is a very simple dynamic. God has given to us freely in Jesus Christ, and our response in gratitude is to give not only of our spirit, of our discipleship, but also with our material gifts, including money. A generous culture is essential in the church, for reflecting the nature of the God whom we worship and who calls us, but also practically, to enable our churches to develop sustainable and long-term ministry.

I know continued generosity is a challenge, but it's a challenge we need to meet. I want to encourage parishes to build a generous church, rooted in growing generous discipleship of individuals, letting us do what we believe we are called to do. But if we believe in doing it, we need to pay for it.

Alongside this letter the PCC have received the share request for 2024 and a guide which provides a bit more detail on where the money goes. Please do ask to see it if you want to know more. I am encouraging everyone, both personally and as part of your parish community, to think about our shared purpose in building a generous church. You may want to talk with your PCC about your plans for next year and your response to the share request.

I am extremely grateful for those who give sacrificially. We could not do any of this without you.

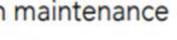


