
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Letter from your Vicar

Christmas or Easter, which one is your favourite?

Of course, for many people the instinctive reaction is probably Christmas. Christmas is by far the biggest event of the year in our country and in much of the western world. Christmas is certainly the biggest consumer event of the year and is often referred to as "the saviour" of many retailers with billions of pounds being spent. Santa is a very busy man and mum and dad must help out though, it has been noted that if you were to take Christ out of Christmas all you would be left with is "M&S".

There can be no doubt that the joy and fun of Christmas is a wonderful thing and that it is rightly enjoyed by all generations not just children. This year in Meltham there was a great deal of joy and fun and it was wonderful to have so many people come and join us at our Church events. I thank God for the success of all these events, but I am also extremely grateful to all the many people who gave up their time to help make them happen.

I was watching 'Pointless' a few weeks ago whilst making tea and the category of questions was titled – 'The Lazy Persons Guide to Saving the World'. My ears immediately pricked up! That sounds like something I might find useful. I went on GOOGLE and there it was – The United Nations', no less, so it must be good

There are four levels to aim for, starting at Level 1, which quite frankly I hope we are well past! Things to do from your sofa –

Use technology to stay informed on Green Matters – loads of good stuff on the 'net. Stop paper bills, pay on line. Try go paperless, using emails & texts where you can. 'Share' and don't just 'Like' any good articles you discover relating to Climate Change and the environment, you'll reach many more people.

CROSSROADS CENTRE

The Crossroads shop continued to be busy throughout December with many items of clothing going for £1 or less.

A programme of refurbishment then began in the shop The first phase being done over the Christmas break. LED strip lighting has replaced the old strip lighting and the bays have been painted with new sign work added which has improved the working environment for staff. A disused toilet was capped off and shelving is to be built to extend the storage space. Plastering work was done in the kitchen and adjacent storage area and the kitchen units and a sink were replaced. Vinyl flooring has replaced old flooring that was becoming unsafe in the kitchen and toilet areas. A new till area has been installed and racks taken down from behind windows to allow more light into the shop. A blind has been purchased to cover the back of the children's display window to be used during cashing up and when the shop is closed.

Displays have been repositioned to create a men's clothing and accessories area and the women's accessories have been repositioned next to the women's clothing.

Windows and doors will be replaced over the coming months subject to planning permission and finally a new carpet will be laid.

The aim of the refurbishment is to provide a safe, warm environment for staff and customers, reduce energy bills, and enable the shop to be sustainable over the next few decades with increased security.

The foodbank has been extremely busy, and we are pleased to welcome some new volunteers. Food parcels were particularly generous over the Christmas period and were given out to 69 foodbank clients along with a Christmas hamper. 41 hampers were also delivered to families suggested by 3 local primary schools as well as 30 Christmas dinners being supplied. Reverse advent calendars throughout November and December from Meltham Methodist and Wilshaw churches yielded food for Christmas and beyond. The Holme Valley Lions donated 4 generous vouchers, and Ali at Meltham Barbers gave away 15 free haircuts. Taylor Transol gave a very generous food donation, Meltham Church of the Latter Day Saints collected a wonderful array of foods, a resident of Meltham wishing to remain anonymous did an enormous online shop to be delivered at the foodbank, Morrison's Community Giving Tree was for the foodbank's benefit and finally Meltham Under 15s made a generous donation of food.

Carols in the Park supported the foodbank with money raised at the event also Richard Styan asked that donations were given to the foodbank in lieu of presents for his 100th birthday. As the project develops so the generous folk of Meltham dig deep in order for us to help more people in our community.

The Crossroads Centre continues to be manned from 10am to 1pm Monday to Friday with an additional 2 hours to 3pm on Wednesdays when Chris our debt and

benefit advisor sees his clients. Nigel continues to be busy offering free legal advice on a Thursday morning,

Grants to increase the number of services that Crossroads can offer have been applied for and received. A Health Inequalities Grant was applied for, to help fund a Health Fair which took place on Weds 17th January at the Centre in collaboration with the Carlile Institute. Health professionals and local groups gave advice and groups from Meltham provided information and advice on ways of keeping healthy. Despite it being a very cold and snowy day we were pleased to welcome those able to brave the icy conditions.

Warm and Welcoming Wednesday also qualified for a grant from the West Yorkshire Mayors Fund and continues to meet with refreshments and home-made soup is also now provided.

Sleeping bags, duvets, kitchen items and blankets are also given out as well as warm clothing from the shop when requested.

The Sustainable Sewing Bees continue to meet on Fridays using fabric and haberdashery from the shop to make items to sell for the Crossroads project and often just to chat together and enjoy sewing.

The Centre continues to be a meeting place for local groups such as Craft and Create who meet at the Centre on Thursdays. A ukulele group meets one afternoon a week and the WI occasionally use our facilities.

Outlookers, a service for the visually impaired, meet every 2nd Tuesday of the month and is open to anyone needing support through sight impairment.

The Grant's Committee continues to meet once a quarter. Grants to those experiencing hardship are prioritised over local groups but all applications are considered with an experienced chair of the committee approaching applicants via telephone to ask for more information when necessary.

As always we thank you for your prayers and support and look forward to 2024 and the opportunities, we will have to support those in need.

What's so special about Jesus?

It is with great sadness that Rev John Radcliffe died at the end of last year. However he was a man that wanted everyone to know more about Jesus. So as Lent begins, it is a good time to look at why Jesus was so special. The following helps to focus our thoughts and it written by the Revd Dr Herbert McGonigle.

The gospels record that people were astounded by many of the things that Jesus said. Even His enemies, intent on trapping Him, admitted: "No one ever spoke the way this man does." (John 7:46) Furthermore, "the crowds were amazed at His teaching, because He taught as one who had authority, and not as their teachers of the law." (Matthew 7:28-9)

For in Jesus, we find something without precedent in the span of human literature. While urging humility on others and while giving the impression of the ultimately humble person, Jesus' teaching and claims are basically *egocentric and completely focussed on Himself*. In ordinary life, that would get a person labelled as crazy or as a megalomaniac!

Just think of the few astounding claims Jesus made about Himself. "I am the Resurrection and the Life." (Jn 11.25) "I am the Bread of Life." (Jn 6:35) "I am the Light of the World." (Jn 8:12) "I am the Good Shepherd." (Jn 10:7,9) "...whoever lives and believes in Me will never die." (Jn 11:26) And – most staggering of all - "anyone who has seen Me has seen the Father." (Jn 14:9)

CS Lewis comments on the inescapableness of Jesus' uniqueness: "There is no half-way house, and there is no parallel in other religions."

That Jesus cannot be ranked among a pantheon of religious leaders or prophets becomes further obvious when one reflects further on His claim of being at both the beginning and at the end of Creation and of History. He said: "I am the First and the Last" (Rev 1:17), as well as : "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me." (Mt 28:18).

Clearly the disciples accepted this, as John begins his gospel with these words: "In the beginning was the Word (Jesus) and the Word was with God and the Word was God... Through Him all things were made; without Him nothing was made that has been made....The Word became flesh and made His dwelling among us.... and in Him all things hold together." (Col 1:16,17)

When we look at what Jesus goes on to say about the end of history, we are even more startled, as when He said of any person who follows Him: "I will raise him up at the last day." (Jn 6:40) This was the local carpenter, remember! And when we note that throughout the Bible final judgement is a function reserved to God alone, it is astounding to register that Jesus says of Himself: "For as the Father has life in Himself, so He has granted the Son authority to judge because He is the Son of Man." (Jn 5:26—27)

Yes, between Creation and the end of History stands Jesus. That also means, of course, and we note it with comfort, because everything in between is His also.

During Lent, why not spend some time thinking about these claims of Jesus?

Gone are the days sadly of us going out carol singing around the village in the run up to Christmas, but we were however able to go and sing for the residents down at Greenacres





Care Home.

Amongst the residents was life long

choir member David Earnshaw who has now retired from singing in the choir. We invited David to sit amongst the choir and sing along with us, as it just didn't feel right that he was sat in the 'audience'. We took the opportunity to thank David for his dedication to the church and for his 75+ years of singing in the choir and presented him with some framed paintings of scenes from around Meltham which had been painted by John Mitchell. We sang all the well known carols and the residents also sang along - it was

nice to bring some Christmas cheer for them all and to see them joining in. We ended the night by singing 'Good Night dear friends' and David duly obliged in leading us in with the 'Good Night'. It has to be said, a good night was had by all. It was certainly a lot warmer in there rather than going out singing in the streets!

We are currently looking at the feasibility of possibly singing Stainer's Crucifixion this year, probably on Palm Sunday (24th March). Please let myself or a choir member know if you would be interested in taking part and able to join us.

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Update from Bell House Care Home


